### Vision

To maintain and further strengthen the key position in the local market and transform into a prominent reinsurance company in international markets.

### Mission

- Provide quality service and effective solutions with best practice standards.
- Further strengthen its strong capital structure and financial adequacy.
- Ensure ethical, transparent conduct and high standards in its relations and to create value for all counterparties.
- Further enhance the development and the performance of employees aligned with the company-wide strategic targets.

Accepting business on a voluntary basis from the Turkish market since 1991, Milli Re fulfills alone nearly 25% of the industry's need for reinsurance coverage.

Milli Reasürans (Milli Re) was set up by Türkiye İş Bankası (İşbank) to operate the compulsory reinsurance system on February 26, 1929 and commenced operations on July 19, 1929.

Milli Re was the world's first and only private company operating a compulsory reinsurance system. Another feature that set Milli Re apart from its peers and competitors was that compulsory cessions were made in all insurance branches.

Being a key actor in the formation and the development of the Turkish insurance industry, Milli Re made numerous contributions while operating the compulsory reinsurance system, including:

- Nationalization of the Turkish insurance industry,
- Generation of continuous revenues for the Turkish Treasury,
- Significant reduction in the outflow of foreign currencies,
- Execution of training and education programs in insurance business,
- Conducting top-notch international relations.

Leading the sector for eighty-two years, Milli Re ranked 61st among the 150 largest reinsurance companies in terms of net premiums generated in 2008, according to the ranking made by Standard & Poor's (S&P).

Enjoying a prestigious position in the international markets, Milli Re managed the Turkish Reinsurance Pool from 1963 to 1985, and the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO) Pool from 1967 to 1995 which was originally established under the name RCD Pool. Managing the Federation of Afro-Asian Insurers and Reinsurers (FAIR) Reinsurance Pool since 1974, the Company has also taken on the management of the Turkish Catastrophe Insurance Pool (TCIP), whose formation it spearheaded, from 2000 to 2005.

In line with the new strategy adopted, Milli Re has been focusing intensively on writing business from overseas markets. Aiming to increase global expansion and geographical diversification, this strategy also seeks to achieve a more balanced portfolio. In foreign acceptances, main focus is on emerging Asian and African countries along with Middle Eastern and East European countries.

While the Company's performance is closely monitored by international rating agencies, A.M. Best has affirmed Milli Re's financial strength rating (FSR) as B++ (Good) on September 20, 2010. The outlook on the FSR remained stable. According to A.M. Best, this rating reflects Milli Re's strong capitalization and dominant position in the local market.

Standard & Poor's (S&P) affirmed its Turkish national scale rating on Milli Re as "trAA", effective from September 17, 2010. Standard & Poor's advises that the rating reflects the Company's leading competitive position in Turkey and its increasing international business.

Combining its professional experience that spans over more than eight decades with its robust financial structure and operational performance, Milli Re will continue to offer its reinsurance capacity to domestic and international markets.

#### Milli Re Singapore Branch

As part of Milli Re's efforts to expand its presence into foreign markets, the Company, like many other internationally operating reinsurance companies, examined the benefits of opening regional branches. Accordingly it was decided to open a branch in Singapore, primarily in view of the relative weight of the Far East in the global insurance market, as well as its potential business volume and geographical location.

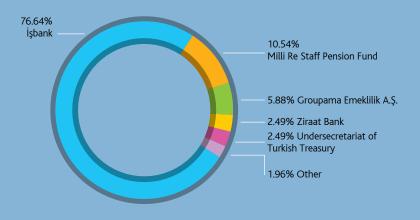
Having received the license for operation from the Monetary Authority of Singapore (MAS) in November 2007, the Singapore Branch rapidly pressed ahead with setting up basic infrastructure including the establishment of a data processing system and employment of personnel, and began to write business from April 1st, 2008. The Singapore Branch plays an important role in the international portfolio of Milli Re.

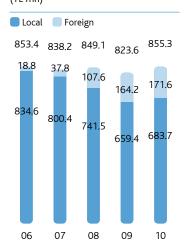

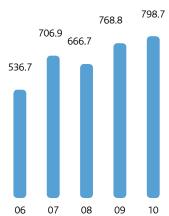

#### **Milestones**

### 1929

Milli Re is founded by İşbank with a capital of TL 1,000,000 to operate the compulsory reinsurance system.



### 1963

The management of "Turkish Reinsurance Pool" established to accept international business was handed over to Milli Re in accordance with the agreement with Turkish insurance companies.

### 1967

The management of "RCD Fire Reinsurance Pool" established under an agreement entitled "Cooperation for Regional Development" between Turkey, Iran and Pakistan, was handed to Milli Re.

### 1970

The management of the system known as "Decree Pool" established according to Decree no. 17 set out by the Ministry of Finance on the Protection of the Value of Turkish Currency was handed to Milli Re.

"Türk Sigorta Enstitüsü Vakfı" (Turkish Insurance Institute Foundation) was established by Milli Re and the Association of the Insurance and Reinsurance Companies of Turkey.



### 1974

The management of "Fair Reinsurance Pool" established by the Federation of Afro-Asian Insurers & Reinsurers (FAIR) was handed to Milli Re.



### 1982

Compulsory reinsurance cessions to Milli Re on Quota Share Basis were changed to Surplus Basis.

#### 1986

MİLTAŞ Sports Facilities, built under the efforts of Milli Re, and which hosts the traditional "International Insurers Tennis Tournament", was brought into the service of the sector.



### 1991

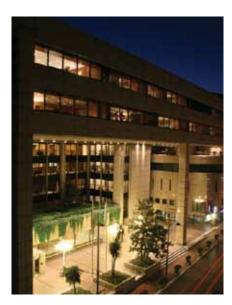
Milli Re began to offer reinsurance capacity on voluntary basis to the sector, by drawing up its first reinsurance agreements besides "Compulsory Cessions" and "Decree Pool".

"Reasürör" magazine, which is a scientific resource with full academic content including compilations, translations, interviews, and statistical information in a variety of branches, was first published.



### 1993

Milli Re moved to its head office newly constructed in Teşvikiye.



### 1994

Milli Reasürans Art Gallery, a corporate gallery where works by prominent local and foreign artists are exhibited, and renowned for its publications, was opened.



#### 1996

Milli Reasürans Chamber Orchestra was established. The orchestra is made up of artists, most of whom also continue their solo music careers, and the orchestra performs with the participation of locally and internationally known conductors and musicians.



### 2000

Turkish Catastrophe Insurance Pool (TCIP) set up alongside the "Compulsory Earthquake Insurance" system established by the Undersecretariat of Turkish Treasury became operational under the management of Milli Re.

### 2001

Risk-based Compulsory Reinsurance System was terminated.

### 2005

Milli Re became the only active and local reinsurance company in the Turkish market after purchasing Destek Reasürans T.A.Ş.

### 2006

Milli Re began to actively accept business from outside Turkey.

The system called Decree Pool was terminated.

### 2007

The Singapore Branch, which is expected to play an important role for Milli Re in expanding its presence in foreign markets, was opened.



### 2010

Milli Re acquired an additional 35.53% stake in Anadolu Sigorta, which is a group company.

Accordingly, Milli Re, Turkey's one and only active local reinsurance company, increased its share in the capital of Anadolu Sigorta, one of the largest and established insurance companies in the sector, to 57.31%.

#### Chairman's Message



Maintaining its strong presence in the Turkish insurance industry for 82 years as a local company backed by national capital, Milli Re constantly developed its position ever since its establishment and became a leading reinsurer and market maker in the Turkish insurance industry.

Milli Re sustained its successful performance in 2010 and maintained its presence among the most preferred reinsurers by international groups for their portfolios in Turkey.

#### The insurance market will achieve permanence in real growth.

While 2010 was a year of improvement in the economy, it also saw the adoption of various measures by insurance companies in certain loss giving branches. The insurance industry was able to close 2010 registering growth exceeding the rate of inflation. It is expected that, in 2011, the Turkish economy and the local insurance market will achieve continuity in real growth, and some vital hints and developments will be unveiled, pointing at the direction of the market's future structural development.

#### Milli Re continued to be a reliable reinsurer.

Milli Re continues to be a preferred and reliable local reinsurer owing to its financial strength, deep-rooted history and solid infrastructure, in a market mostly populated by companies backed by foreign capital.

Maintaining a strong presence in the Turkish insurance industry for 82 years as a local company backed by national capital, Milli Re constantly developed its position ever since its establishment and became a leading reinsurer and market maker in the Turkish insurance industry.

### We are enhancing the experience we have gained as a local power in global markets.

Our Company maintains its target of being a preferred reinsurer in international markets, as well as sustaining its leadership in the Turkish insurance market. Its international portfolio generating 20% of its total premium production today, Milli Re is regarded as a reliable business partner by foreign companies owing to its robust financial structure and sensitivity in prompt loss payments.

Looking at the last five-year period in the Turkish insurance market, it can be seen that the competition is getting fiercer among insurance companies most of which are now controlled by foreign capital. Foreign interest in the Turkish insurance market is expected to continue in 2011. Maintaining its market share despite the tough competition in the market, Milli Re will remain to be the leading reinsurer in the years ahead with its predetermined strategies and goals.

### We have incorporated a selective underwriting strategy to achieve a profitable and productive portfolio structure.

Our Company was able to achieve limited growth in premium in 2010. There was no premium growth at the end of 2009 due to pruning measures involving withdrawal from operations particularly in loss-incurring branches, as well as the economic crisis that plagued the whole world.

The ultimate goal of Milli Re goes beyond securing growth in premium production only; but also entails achieving profitable results. In line with this strategy, it is intended to continue withdrawal from poor performing accounts in the future, if so deemed necessary, and to focus on technical profit.

#### We are concentrating on investments that will add to our strength.

Being Turkey's single active local reinsurance company, Milli Re increased its share in the capital of Anadolu Sigorta, one of the largest and most established insurance companies in the sector which is owned by the same investment group, to 57.31%.

In the years ahead, Milli Re will maintain its target of being a preferred insurer in international markets, as well as its leading position in the local market in line with its vision, mission, and identified strategies.

As a member of a prominent and reliable reinsurer in the local and international arena, alike, I would like to extend my gratitude to all our shareholders and particularly İşbank for their strength and continuous support in bringing us to this prestigious position, to all insurance companies for their trust and faith in our Company, and our valuable employees for their committed hard work.

The insurance industry was able to close 2010 registering a growth level exceeding the rate of inflation.

The ultimate goal of Milli Re goes beyond securing growth in premium production only; but also entails achieving profitable results.



Over the course of more than eight decades since its incorporation, Milli Re has witnessed the evolutionary journey of the Turkish economy, and assumed and successfully fulfilled many fundamental duties in the local insurance industry since its establishment.

Milli Re has always provided the reinsurance capacity needed by the Turkish insurance industry with the best terms and conditions and contributed significantly to the satisfaction of policyholders of insurance companies with its prompt settlements.

### In the wake of the global crisis, the recovery continues on a global scale and in the Turkish economy.

2010 was mainly characterized by the decoupling that became more pronounced in the growth rates of emerging versus developed economies. Weak growth and negative employment conditions in developed countries signaled that the struggle of these economies against the effects of the crisis will continue for a while. Emerging countries, despite exhibiting heterogenity in the circumstances, endorsed their position as the drivers of the world economy in general with their solid rates of growth.

Post crisis recovery in the global economy during 2010 led to increase in inflation rate projections. However, public debt issues in certain European countries, mainly Greece and Ireland and also including Portugal and Spain, coupled with the deterioration in the economic indicators for US, caused a relative decline in inflation rate expectations as compared with the start of the year. On the other hand, expansionary monetary policies remained in force throughout the year in developed countries that featured high budget deficits and debt stocks.

#### Positive developments were attained in the key economic indicators of Turkey.

Turkish economy regained a sustainable growth trend in 2010. Unlike many developed and emerging economies, our country showed strong resilience to the global crisis with the sound banking system, solid real industry, and with a relatively low level borrowing on household scale.

With the strong performance through the year 2010 resulting in a growth rate of 8.9%, the Turkish economy is expected to maintain growth in 2011 with the major contribution of domestic demand. Data on industrial production and capacity utilization point out that the economic growth has also continued in the third quarter.

While industrial production grew by 10% in the third quarter of 2010, capacity utilization ratio was also up by 5.4 percentage points year on and rose to 74%. In 2010, the GDP on the basis of fixed prices was TL 105,680 million.

2010 has been a productive year for financial markets in Turkey, as well. The positive impact of strong macroeconomic indicators, combined with the post-crisis increase in lending levels and industrial production resulted in a 25% rise in the ISE 100 index.

#### Our industry grew in real terms during 2010.

Following the negative trend in premium production in 2008 and 2009 reflecting the impact of the global financial crisis in the recent years, our industry was able to attain real growth in 2010. Although final results are yet to be published, total premium production is estimated to reach TL 14 billion in 2010 based on available data. This amount corresponds to a year-on rise of 13.5% approximately.

During 2010, no catastrophe losses occurred in Turkey, nor were there any major risk losses. Therefore, companies operating in the insurance industry did not encounter any problems in the renewal of proportional and non-proportional reinsurance agreements for 2011. Yet, it can be stated that the local insurance industry had one of its worst years in terms of profitability, as the result of the significant decline in financial income on investment portfolios reflecting the developments in national economy coupled with the prevailing price-based competition. With the strong performance through the year 2010 resulting in a growth rate of 8.9%, the Turkish economy is expected to keep growing in 2011.

In 2010, the GDP on the basis of fixed prices was TL 105,680 million.

New arrangements introduced by the Undersecretariat of Treasury during 2010 aiming to ensure that companies take countermeasures in matters that negatively influence their financial structures and calculation of technical provisions using actuarial methods were welcomed by industry players.

#### Soft market conditions persist in reinsurance markets.

Looking at the world reinsurance markets, natural catastrophes that occurred during 2010 caused approximately USD 37 billion insured losses. Particularly Chilean Earthquake, Winter Storm Xynthia, New Zealand Earthquake, and the floods in Central and Eastern Europe and Australia caused significant insured losses, while the Earthquake in Haiti and the flood losses in China and Pakistan resulted in massive death tolls.

Despite these circumstances and apart from a few exceptions, prevailing soft market conditions in reinsurance markets persisted on global scale mainly due to the globally increased supply of reinsurance capacity, with the contribution of positive results reinsurers achieved in 2009.

#### Milli Re achieved 3.7% growth in total assets.

Milli Re generated TL 855.3 million premium with TL 683.7 million from local and TL 171.6 million from overseas business in 2010. Our Company posted TL 64.1 million profit on its 2010 operations despite all negative developments in the industry. Total assets reached TL 1,621 million and shareholders' equity increased to TL 799 million as of year-end.

Our paid-in capital rose to TL 525 million with the capital increase of TL 140 million effected in 2010. Another highlight of 2010 was our Company's acquisition of an additional 35.53% stake in the share capital of group company Anadolu Sigorta, a key actor in the insurance market. Consequently, our Company's share in Anadolu Sigorta went up from 21.78% to 57.31%.

#### We maintained our leadership in the Turkish reinsurance market.

Foreign interest in insurance companies operating in our industry still continues. This trend is expected to carry on in the future through further mergers and acquisitions until the number of companies reaches the optimal level required by the market conditions.

In spite of this change in the capital structure, Milli Re maintains its market share and leadership in the Turkish reinsurance market as the single local reinsurance company. Milli Re had around 25% share in proportional and around 12% in non-proportional reinsurance agreements in 2010.

#### Milli Re is the only Turkish reinsurer operating in international markets.

Milli Re has set out with the confidence and respectability secured by being the only local reinsurance company in the Turkish insurance industry and been able to build an efficient and solid structure that is able to withstand international competition and market conditions in global reinsurance markets as well.

Focused on the future, our Company has the necessary capital and infrastructural and superstructural capabilities for further growth. Milli Re, maintaining its solid position in the local insurance market, conducts steady development in international business in accordance with the strategy of geographical diversification and extending capacity to overseas markets.

Having contributed to the development of the Turkish insurance industry for 82 years, Milli Re will maintain and further increase its efforts to become a constantly preferred business partner on the basis of its strong financial structure, well-deserved prestige enjoyed in many countries, reliability, and innovative approach.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our shareholders, our Board of Directors, business partners and employees, who have played a central role in the achievements of our Company.

Focused on the future, our Company has the necessary capital and all infrastructural and superstructural capabilities for further growth.

#### **Turkish Economy and Outlook**

Stepping into a rapid growth process following the contraction in 2009, the Turkish economy grew by 8.9% in 2010 and registered a GDP of TL 105,680 million.

#### Turkish economy entered into a rapid recovery.

The GDP increased by 11.8% and by 10.2% in the first and second quarters of 2010 respectively, and grew by 5.5% in the third quarter despite the loss of pace in the growth rate. Thus, the contraction of 2009 was followed by a rapid growth. The expansion in GDP is driven particularly by the ultimate domestic demand.

Calendar adjusted gross domestic product in fourth quarter of 2010 increased by 9.6% compared to the same quarter of previous year while seasonal and calendar adjusted GDP increased by 3.6% compared to previous quarter.

Annual gross domestic product in 2010 increased by 16.0% and reached to TL 1,105,101 million in current prices and increased by 8.9% and reached to TL 105,680 million in fixed prices.

Although at a declining pace, industrial production went up 10% in the third quarter of 2010 and the capacity utilization rate increased by 5.4 percentage points year-to-year to 74%. The rate of growth in the first nine months of 2010 was 8.9%; on the basis of sectors, the construction industry showed the largest expansion with 18.4%. As the agricultural sector declined by 0.3%, there was 14.7% rise in the manufacturing industry and 13.6% in commerce.

#### Targeted inflation is almost reached.

6.53% in December 2009, the CPI stood at 6.4% in December 2010, almost spot-on with the yearend target of 6.5%.

Throughout the year, the increase in alcoholic beverages and the tobacco group has been the biggest source of the rise in inflation. When compared on year-to-year basis, the highest rise in the index took place in the alcoholic beverages and tobacco group with 24.66%. Restaurants and hotels, food and non-alcoholic beverages, and transportation are the other expenditure groups with high increases with respective ratios of 9.76%, 7.02% and 6.78%.

The PPI, on the other hand, climbed from 5.93% in December 2009 to 8.87% in December 2010.

Evaluated on the basis of the sub-sectors of the industry, the PPI results showed the highest monthly rise in the manufacture of coke and refined petroleum products sub-sector with 8.72%. Other sub-sectors that displayed the highest increase over the previous month were: basic metal industry (6.42%), metallic minerals (6.35%), textile products (3.96%), radio, TV, communication equipment and appliances (3.37%), wearing apparel (2.87%), water (2.54%), and crude petroleum and natural gas production (2.52%).

On the other hand, the greatest declines that put a downward pressure on the change in the PPI came in furniture, n.e.c. (-2.47%), paper and paper products (-0.37%), and publishing and printing (-0.03%).

#### The revival in economic activity was accompanied by increased current deficit.

Growth driven by domestic demand, appreciation of the Turkish lira, and the recovery in production, combined with the need for imported intermediate goods and energy boost the foreign trade deficit and current deficit.

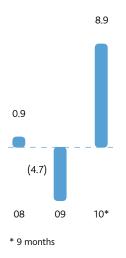
In 2010, the foreign trade deficit hiked 84.5% year-on and rose to USD 71.6 billion. In the same period, the ratio of exports to imports declined to 61.4%.

Looking at 2010 as a whole, the current deficit surged by 247.1% as compared with 2009 and shot up from USD 14 billion to USD 48.6 billion.

#### Investment inflows bear a positive impact upon financial markets.

The accelerated capital inflow that followed the global crisis was driven mainly by the increase in other liabilities in connection with the rise in the overseas debts of the banks, in particular. Direct investments, which contribute positively to the financing of current deficit and covers long-term capital inflow, had a gradually decreasing weight in capital inflows.

Having amounted to USD 32.6 billion on annual basis as of September 2010, capital inflows comprised of other liabilities worth USD 14.6 billion, and portfolio investments of USD 12.9 billion, while direct investments accounted for a mere USD 5.1 billion.

Improved risk perceptions in relation to Turkey and the increased global risk appetite positively influence the stock and bond market. During 2010, stock markets continued to rise, producing price-earnings ratios that were close to the historical average. Bond prices increased similarly to the stock market. As a result, there was a parallel decline in the interests on government debt instruments.

#### The Turkish lira continued to gain value.

While liquidity conditions improved along with the increased capital inflows stimulated by the confidence in financial markets, the Turkish lira preserved its standing against foreign currencies also in 2010. Real exchange rates pointed at the strengthening trend of the Turkish currency; as of end-November 2010, TL was appreciated by 12.8% as compared with year-end 2009 according to the CPI-based index, and by 11.6% according to the PPI-based index.

### Global liquidity, credit volume, and current deficit are the key drivers on sustainable stability.

Unless a surprise development takes place in global economic conditions, and unless a considerable change is implemented in the monetary policies in force in major countries, global liquidity will continue to flow into emerging markets, which include Turkey and present a combination of stability and high returns.

Besides global capital inflows, the expansion in the lending volume and current deficit come to the fore as major factors that will determine the sustainability of the growth and stability in the Turkish economy.

Another risk element that needs to be watched closely with respect to Turkey is the growing depth and prevalence of the issues in developed economies and primarily in the Euro area. Such a situation might affect Turkey on the international trade wing, in addition to the lending and investments wing.

#### Turkish economy is expected to keep growing in 2011.

Turkey's dodging the effects of the global crisis of 2008-2009 on the back of a solid economic recuperation is underpinned by the reforms that have been put into force since 2001 and that enabled implementation of determined policies during the crisis.

In 2011, private sector support driven by the strong domestic demand and lending mechanism, and the positive effect of public expenditures to be stimulated by the upcoming elections are projected to trigger economic growth.

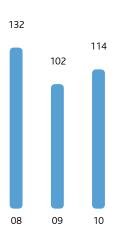
Looking to the future, it can be seen that the government's performance was reinforced by the actions taken against global recession. Although the combination of taxes and expenditures still reveals long-term difficulties, the Medium Term Program 2011-2013 envisages a gradual improvement in the public sector balances.

The key macroeconomic risk is the possible major slowdown in growth which might be caused by a reversed course in capital inflows when the high current deficit is taken into consideration. In the long run, higher productivity, higher exports to markets of greater diversity, higher domestic savings, and higher energy productivity and diversification will all play key roles in lessening Turkey's dependence on external funding. In order to secure improvements in these areas, structural reforms will have to be introduced in labor and product markets. This will have a positive effect not only on the current account balance, but also on Turkey's growth potential.

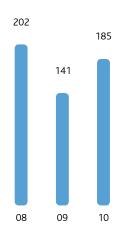

# An Overview of the Turkish Insurance Industry in 2010

According to figures released by the Association of Turkish Insurance and Reinsurance Companies (TSRŞB), Turkish insurance market data show real growth of 13% in life branch and about 6% in nonlife branches.

As a result of the revision made in the Earthquake Tariff by the Undersecretariat of Treasury in 2010, Commercial and Industrial Risks with sums insured exceeding TL 100 million were excluded from the Earthquake Tariff implementation.

#### In 2010, total premiums in the Turkish insurance market rose by 13.6% year-onyear.

While the Turkish insurance market did not show real growth in terms of premium production in 2008 and 2009 due to the major impact inflicted by the global financial crisis of the past several years, it is estimated to display nearly 7% growth in real terms in 2010 according to results published by the Association of Turkish Insurance and Reinsurance Companies (TSRŞB). The real growth is estimated to materialize in the region of 13% and 6% in life and non-life branches respectively.

#### Life branch accounted for nearly 15% of total premiums.

In the recent years, life insurance has been exhibiting a stable growth propelled mainly by the increase in bank loans. However, since life branch accounts for nearly 15% of total premiums, the rate of real growth in this branch does not have a big influence on the total premium increase.

Looking at the real increases in the leading non-life branches with the highest premium production in 2010, it is observed that the increase in the Land Vehicles and Land Vehicles Liability insurance paralleled the real rate of increase in the overall market, and that the General Losses branch which also includes Engineering did not show a considerable rise. On the other hand, there was a significant increase of 14% in real terms, in the Health branch, while Fire and Natural Catastrophes insurance decreased by 4% in real terms.

### There was real shrinkage in premiums written in Fire and Natural Catastrophes Insurance.

The key reason that led to the real shrinkage in premiums written in Fire and Natural Catastrophes Insurance is the longstanding destructive competition among insurance companies focusing solely on cutting prices. It is a well-known fact that in this branch, premiums are calculated only on earthquake rates in these policies, and fire and allied perils have no weight in the determination of premiums.

In addition to this, Commercial and Industrial Risks with insured amounts exceeding TL 100 million have been excluded from the Earthquake Tariff implementation as a result of the revisions made by the Undersecretariat of Treasury to Earthquake Tariff in 2010; previously the threshold was USD 100 million. With the introduction of a lower limit for exclusion of commercial and industrial risks from the Tariff implementation, the number of risks that fall outside the scope of the Tariff increased, meaning that more risks became susceptible to competition by way of price discounts in the market. This is another important reason that brought about the real shrinkage in the premiums on Fire and Natural Catastrophe Insurance.

#### There was more than 35% increase in the number of Health policies.

The significant rise in real terms in premiums generated on health insurance was the result of the price increases effected to cut back and eliminate the losses that had been posted in this branch for many years, and also of more than 35% year-on growth in the number of policies.

During 2010, total number of policies went up by 17% in non-life branches, and by 36% in the life branch. The expansion in the total number of policies was stimulated by new compulsory policies introduced in liability insurance, as well as the alleviated effects of the financial crisis, and the increased land vehicle and real property sales, which in turn led to increased bank loans, owing to the extraordinary performances of the automotive and construction industries.

### In 2010, highest technical losses were produced by Land Vehicles, Land Vehicles Liability (Traffic) and Health branches.

Although there was real growth in the total number of policies and premiums in 2010, the growth was not reflected on the industry as technical and balance sheet profitability, when 12-month results are taken into consideration; hence, many companies in the industry will close the year posting losses, as was the case in 2009.

As in previous years, highest technical losses were produced by Land Vehicles, Land Vehicles Liability (Traffic) and Health branches. Measures adopted to mitigate loss in health insurance started to bear their positive outcome this year, with a relatively lower technical loss in 2010 as compared with 2009.

The leading branches in terms of premium production, Land Vehicles and Land Vehicles Liability insurances produced higher level of losses as compared with the previous year. This was caused by non-technical pricing, which in turn leading to inadequate premium, base against increased loss payouts due to the implementation of Accident Reports issued by the parties involved in a traffic accident under the Land Vehicles Liability insurance. It could also be stated that the losses that were posted in the sector in 2010 were also contributed by the new regulatory arrangement in relation to provisions introduced by the Undersecretariat of Treasury in order to strengthen the financial structures of insurance companies within the frame of efforts to attain alignment with the EU, and by the reduced Financial Income.

Measures adopted to mitigate loss in health insurance started to bear their positive outcome this year, with a relatively lower technical loss in 2010 as compared with 2009.

#### Reinsurance supply was still in excess of demand on a global level.

Despite the intense loss activity in terms of attritional and catastrophic losses during the first half of 2010, full year results for most industry players have turned out to be much better than initially expected.

Although profits were lower compared to 2009 which was an exceptionally good year for the market, the industry remained highly capitalized owing to recoveries in investment returns albeit not at the same level as a few years ago and continuing strong reserve releases. Consequently, on a global level reinsurance supply was still in excess of demand.

### The Chilean Earthquake turned out to be a larger market loss than initially predicted.

The first six months of 2010 saw significant losses from global catastrophes. The Chilean Earthquake, considered as the largest non-US natural catastrophe loss in history, turned out to be a larger market loss than initially predicted. Following early insured loss estimates of around USD 2 billion, estimates have continuously been revised upwards throughout 2010 and it is expected that the loss could reach up to USD 12 billion with around USD 8 billion cost to the industry and 90% of the loss to be paid by reinsurers due to the high insurance penetration levels in Chile's commercial and industrial segments.

### The ultimate insured loss originated from New Zealand Christchurch Earthquake is estimated to be around USD 3.5-4 billion.

Winterstorm Xynthia impacting parts of Spain, France and central Europe in late February caused heavy damage to residential and commercial properties with a total figure amounting to USD 4.5 billion and insured losses reaching USD 3.4 billion.

The earthquake in Haiti was a devastating event, death toll exceeding 220,000 but only around USD 150 million insured loss due to low insurance penetration. The event triggered Haiti's earthquake coverage with the Caribbean Catastrophe Risk Insurance Facility (CCRIF), which paid out USD 7.75 million to the Haitian government, the full policy limit.

Another costly natural catastrophe in 2010 was the New Zealand Christchurch (Darfield) Earthquake in September, with a currently revised ultimate insured loss around USD 3.5-4 billion.

Hail events and recent Queensland floods in Australia, typhoon Megi (Philippines), floods in Pakistan and Central Eastern Europe as well as various severe weather events in the Midwest of the United States were among other major natural catastrophes which had influence on pricing of loss-impacted programs in these territories only.

### None of these losses was a market-changing event that could reverse the prevailing soft market conditions.

Although none of these losses was a market-changing event that could reverse the prevailing soft market conditions on a global level, there were growing signs of concern by major reinsurers for their exposure and pricing for second tier catastrophe territories, such as Turkey following Chile and New Zealand earthquake losses and a tendency to allocate capacity to peak zones where they considered the pricing more adequate.

The Deepwater Horizon explosion in the Gulf of Mexico in the second quarter, with market loss estimates ranging between USD 1.5 billion to USD 3.5 billion, led to significant rate increases in energy business.

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# An Overview of the Global Reinsurance Market in 2010

### Losses were mostly absorbed by the excess capital without exerting any upward pressure on rates.

As the result of the heavy losses in the beginning of 2010, most reinsurers anticipated to see an end to the soft market, however high loss payouts during the year have generally been insufficient to impact prices because none of the losses were major issues for the catastrophe excess of loss market. Rates generally showed a decline as surplus capital drove down reinsurance prices and losses were mostly absorbed by the excess capital without exerting any upward pressure on rates.

Strong premium growth in emerging markets reflecting the improvement in economies as well as investments, remained insufficient to offset continuing slow-down in premium growth in primary business in the mature markets. Major developed markets like the U.S., Germany, France, and the U.K. faced market-wide premium declines. The impact of this downward pressure was combined with the increased retention levels in the reinsurance programs of most cedants who enjoyed improved financial results and/or strengthened balance sheets due to mergers & acquisitions, which in turn resulted reinsurers facing even lower demand and reduced premium income.

### Rate reductions on 1 January 2011 renewals ranged between 5% to 10% on average.

In this context, rate reductions on 1 January 2011 renewals ranged between 5% to 10% on average. Although there were variations by class and territory as well as exposures and loss history with some loss impacted regional programs seeing only modest decreases and flat renewals, rates in the United States in general fell back to levels in 2008 also reflecting adjustments to catastrophe models that decreased predicted losses for earthquake and wind perils.

Apart from a few local exceptions, soft market conditions were also evident on a global level. Although markets that suffered catastrophe losses in 2010, such as Chile, New Zealand, Pakistan and Central and Eastern Europe saw prices increase in relation with the loss experience of specific programs, the underlying trend elsewhere was for rate reductions.

#### Rate increases around 20% attracted additional capacity.

Retrocessional market reflected the discrepancy between the expectations of the buyers and what markets were charging as there was a continuing tendency in the property catastrophe markets to allocate capacity towards combined territorial covers and peak zones with more attractive pricing. On a general scale, rate increases were around 20% attracting additional capacity which has to some extent moderated any further increases in retrocession costs.

In view of these developments many reinsurers are expected to implement more aggressive capital management strategies in the 1st quarter 2011 through share repurchases, dividend payments and other similar techniques. While merger and acquisition activity seemed to pick up significantly as compared to 2008 and 2009, the number of completed deals remained low due to low valuation of companies leading to resistance in sellers. The main driver for these deals was buyers' intention of diversifying by lines of business and distribution channels.

Strong premium growth in emerging markets reflecting the improvement in economies as well as investments, remained insufficient to offset continuing slow-down in premium growth in primary business in the mature markets.

On a general scale, rate increases were around 20% attracting additional capacity which has to some extent moderated any further increases in retrocession costs. The growth trend in catastrophe bond market is expected to continue in 2011 as well.

Maintaining underwriting discipline and pricing integrity is of utmost importance to reinsurers for managing the cycle successfully.

#### Catastrophe bond market gained a considerable impetus in 2010.

Catastrophe bond market gained impetus in terms of total capacity issued and number of deals executed. 23 catastrophe bond transactions were made in 2010 with a total issuance volume of USD 4.9 billion, exceeding 18 deals and the volume of USD 3.4 billion in 2009.

As investor demand and understanding increased over time, the cost gap between catastrophe bonds and traditional reinsurance has narrowed which leads to an expectation that this trend is likely to continue in 2011 especially in terms of top layers or aggregate covers.

#### Integration works to Solvency II have entered the final stage.

Throughout 2010, European insurers and reinsurers have been testing the proposed capital rules by participating in the Fifth Quantitative Impact Study (QIS 5) as part of the final stage of Solvency II which is scheduled to be effective as from January 2013.

Accordingly, capital requirements obtained from the standard formula under QIS 5 should reflect a 1 in 200 year confidence level and are deemed to be equivalent with a BBB rating. For insurers that have shown technical deficiencies under the QIS 5 exercise, 2011 will be a critical period to identify possible remedies ranging from capital raising, reinsurance solutions to investment strategy.

#### Some reinsurers had to reassess their domicile.

On the other hand, Solvency II, tax legislation and more general regulatory changes have led some reinsurers to reassess their domicile. For years, Bermuda had been attracting start-ups and established reinsurers because it had one of the most competitive tax systems in the world, with no levy on profits, income, dividends or capital gains.

However, for the last couple of years, alternative business circles Ireland and Switzerland in particular, have implemented policies to attract operations away from Bermuda. Recently a number of industry players have established reinsurance platforms in Dublin or Zurich to benefit from relatively stable regulatory environments as well as corporate tax rates below the European average.

Another factor was the fact that larger countries offer more security and capital-raising potential than smaller offshore territories and both Ireland and Switzerland have tax treaties with major markets, including the US. Location is also crucial in companies' decision to shift their activities to these centers as it allows companies to move closer to their clients.

In view of the prevailing soft market conditions and thin investment returns, as well as the attempts to comply with some Solvency II regulations, reinsurers are more susceptible to any market-changing event either through underwriting losses or other capital events. Therefore maintaining underwriting discipline and pricing integrity is of utmost importance to reinsurers for managing the cycle successfully.

2010 saw no major changes in the reinsurance market and Milli Re preserved its market share in terms of both proportional and non-proportional reinsurance agreements in 2011 renewals. This is an important end result of the Company being accepted as a reliable and stable local reinsurance company among the local and foreign insurers operating in our market.

2011 reinsurance renewals went very smoothly due to the absence of major catastrophe risk losses in 2010. Several points that need to be addressed in relation to this year's proportional and non-proportional reinsurance renewals can be summarized as follows:

### Estimated premium income for proportional reinsurance agreements went up by 5% compared to 2010.

There were no significant changes in the 2011 renewals of proportional reinsurance agreements, and insurers, who obtained coverage for risks in their portfolios on the basis of proportional reinsurance programs maintained their existing positions. Premium projection in respect of these reinsurance agreements, including the Land Vehicles branch, was up by 5% as compared with 2010. Even if the estimations are revised during the year to reflect an increase in the region of 6% - 7%, even this level of increase is insufficient under the prevailing positive economic conditions.

Although a final figure is not available regarding the amount of premiums insurers ceded to proportional reinsurance agreements in 2010, it is apparent that companies retained a greater portion of the risk and cut down on their cessions to proportional contracts, when it is considered that the sector registered 13.6% growth in premiums and will most probably achieve the same rate of growth also in 2011.

### No significant difficulties arose in 2011 renewal of catastrophe excess of loss reinsurance agreements.

No significant problems arose either in 2010 and 2011 renewals of the catastrophe excess of loss reinsurance agreements companies purchase against catastrophes such as flood and earthquake, and ceding companies increased the covers they obtained against catastrophic events by 10% on an annual basis due to the increased exposures in their portfolios and the relatively stronger Turkish Lira against foreign currencies.

In 2011 the total amount of catastrophic coverage purchased by the Turkish insurance market is nearly EUR 3,5 billion with a corresponding reinsurance premium of approximately EUR 85 million. When Milli Re's and TCIP catastrophic coverage are included, total amount of catastrophic coverage purchased increased to nearly EUR 5,9 billion with a corresponding premium of nearly EUR 162 million.

#### Milli Re remains to be a reliable reinsurer.

Milli Re retained its existing position and share in the Turkish reinsurance market and provided 25% of the capacity in proportional and 12% in non-proportional agreements as was the case last year. Writing proportional bouquet reinsurance agreements of 23 insurers and leading 14 companies, Milli Re participates in the catastrophe excess of loss programs of 27 insurance companies.

Participating in reinsurance agreements in every branch of almost all of the companies operating in the market, Milli Re remains to be a reliable reinsurer not only for local insurers, but also for those backed by foreign capital, owing to its robust financial structure and capitalization.

In 2011 renewals, Milli Re maintained its market share in terms of both proportional and non-proportional reinsurance agreements.

Companies increased the catastrophe cover they obtained by 10% on an annual basis due to the increased exposures in their portfolios and the relatively stronger Turkish Lira against foreign currencies. While Milli Re attained a 3.7% increase in premium income generated on business accepted from the local market in 2010, this increase was 4.5% in premium generated by overseas business.

Milli Re's premium was TL 855,302,911 in 2010, up by nearly 4% year-on-year.

In 2009, Milli Re did not reach the level of the prior year in total premium production due to the price-based excessive competition in the local market on which approximately 80% of its total premium income is generated and the decision to withdraw from loss producing branches, as well as to the worldwide economic crisis that also affected our country. However, 3.85% premium increase attained in 2010 indicates a positive result, despite the ongoing and even further increasing competition in the local market, and the continuing strategy to gradually withdraw from loss producing branches in the local market.

Further details on Milli Re's local and foreign acceptances are presented in the relevant sections of the report. However, it should be noted that there is no significant difference between the premium growth in business accepted in both units. While the rate of increase in local premium income was 3.7%, the same in overseas premium income was 4.5%.

In the last five-year period starting in 2006, overseas premium income tends to take a constantly growing share of total premium income. Representing 2.2% of the overall portfolio in 2006, the volume of premiums from international business rose to 20% in 2010. This is the result of international expansion activities, as well as factors that reduce local premium income such as the impact of the economic crisis, the intentional withdrawal from certain branches, price-based excessive competition and the tendency of insurance companies to increase their retentions. While premium volume on international business was approximately TL 19 million in 2006, this figure rose to TL 171 million in 2010.

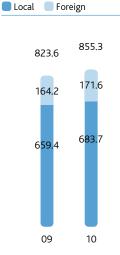

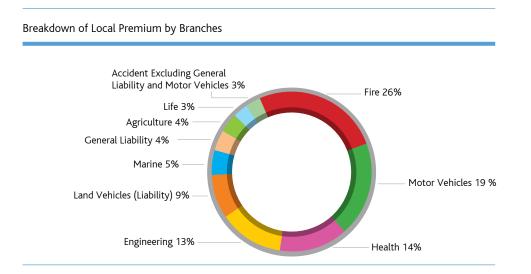
#### Local Acceptances

The Turkish insurance industry had increased premium production approximately by 13.6% by the end of the year.

3.7% increase Milli Re attained in its local premium income was below the rate of increase in the overall Turkish insurance industry; the key reasons include the continued withdrawal from the Land Vehicles insurances, on which nearly 50% of the sector's non-life premiums are generated. Another important factor in this regard was the insurers' tendency to increase their retention ratios in branches like Fire and Marine insurances, which constitute 20% share of the market's non-life premiums.

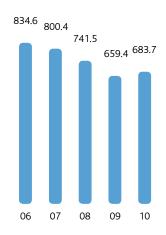
Along with the economic recovery that started from the middle of 2010, year-end results included some striking aspects like the premium increase in Engineering in connection with the growth in investments particularly in the field of energy, and the significant increase in General Liability premiums due to the "Compulsory Liability Insurance for Medical Malpractice" being enforced during the year.

Local premium income rose by nearly 3.7% as of year-end.

Local Premium Income (TL mn)



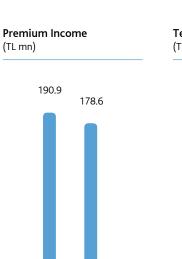
Milli Re generated 26% of its total local non-life premium production in Fire in 2010.

While Fire insurances constituted some 16.5% share of total non-life premiums generated by the overall Turkish insurance industry, Milli Re generated 26% of its total local non-life premium production in Fire in 2010.

Milli Re's outpacing the overall industry in the rate of increase in the premium production in local Fire business was driven mainly by the low retention levels generally adopted in this branch, despite the gradually increases retentions of insurance companies. Local production maintained its level of the prior year and took 66% share of Milli Re's total Fire premium production in the same period.

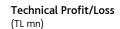
Premiums from industrial and commercial risks to a substantial extent have shown a decline of nearly 6.5% year-on-year. This negative development was mainly the result of the insurers' higher retention levels in connection with the increased number of small and medium risks involved in their portfolios, as well as the price-based competition among the insurance companies that has been going on for several years now.

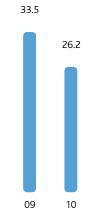

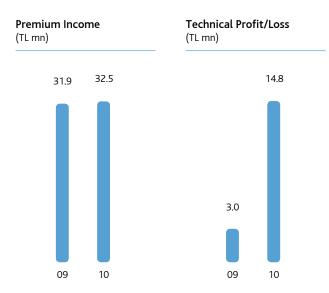
#### Marine

Marine insurances premium in the Turkish insurance industry account for approximately 3.4% of the total non-life premiums. Premium written by Milli Re locally in Marine, on the other hand, corresponds to 4.7% of the total local non-life premium production. This is mainly due to the higher treaty cessions in Marine in general, and in the Hull branch, in particular.

Approximately 59% of the total premium Milli Re wrote in Marine was derived from the Turkish market, marking a nearly 2% increase year-on in local premium. Although significant premium reductions had been recorded due to the direct impact the economic crisis that started by late 2008 had upon the premium production in the following two years, the improvement in the past two years in loss ratios resulted in technical profit in this branch.

Technical profit in Marine amounted to TL 14.8 million.

#### Engineering

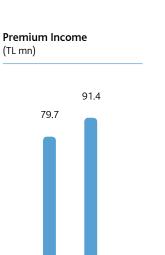
Engineering premiums grew by 15%.

Milli Re's premium production increase in Engineering generated from the local market was 15%. 89% of the Company's Engineering premiums is from local acceptances.

Local premium production of Milli Re in Engineering, which is directly correlated with economic investments, showed a decrease due to the economic crisis that started by late 2008; however, with the positive effect of the recovery that began in 2010, premium production in this branch adopted an upward trend.

Yet, the high loss ratio in Machinery Breakdown and Electronic Equipment insurances, which constitute 65% of total Engineering premiums, tends to go up for the past two years, despite the positive results in Construction and Erection insurances; coupled with this, priced-based competition among the companies aggravates the technical results. Provisions that are required to be set aside pursuant to the IBNR Circular published by the Undersecretariat of Treasury also play a major role in Milli Re's negative results.

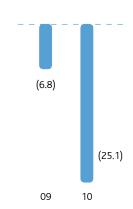

#### Land Vehicles (Own Damage)

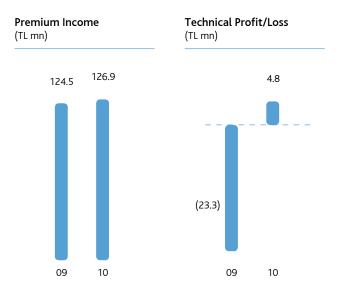
Land Vehicles is one of the branches in which the Turkish insurance industry sustains the highest loss ratios, despite having the highest share of total premium production for many years. In 2010, premium in this branch represented 26% of total non-life premiums.

Within the total local non-life premium production of Milli Re, Land Vehicles branch has approximately 19% share. This is a result of Milli Re's discontinuation of participation in the contracts of certain companies in the market.

In the aftermath of the Company's decision to gradually withdraw from Land Vehicles and Land Vehicles Liability insurances due to the high loss ratios, the premium production displayed a downward trend over the years; the Company intends to remain adhered to this policy in the future, depending on the results to be attained by the reinsured companies. The technical profit attained in this branch this year despite the high technical loss of the previous year is an outcome of this policy. Based on 2010 results, 90% of the premium written in this branch was generated from the local market.

Premium production in the Land Vehicle amounted to TL 126.9 million in 2010.

#### Land Vehicles (Liability)

The Company generates 99% of its production in Land Vehicles Insurances from the local market. Land Vehicles Liability is a branch that has a high loss ratio like the Land Vehicles branch. While the market premium production in this branch accounted for 21% of total non-life premiums, Milli Re's premium in this branch corresponded to approximately 10% of total local non-life premiums.

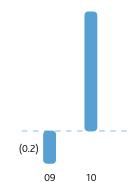
The only reason for the Company's remaining below the average growth rate of the overall sector in this branch is the policy of withdrawing from poorly performing branches implemented for the past several years, just like in the Land Vehicles insurances. Since reinsurance is accepted in combination for Land Vehicles, Motor Reinsurance Cover is given on combined basis for Land Vehicles (Own Damage) and Land Vehicles Liability under the same reinsurance agreements and Liability branches on the basis of a single reinsurance agreement, the withdrawal policy adopted for the Land Vehicles branch applies also for this branch; as a consequence, the decline in premium production seen over the years is expected to continue in the years ahead. The Company generates 99% of its production in this branch from the local market.

#### **General Liability**

Local premiums produced under this headline covering all liability branches, apart from Land Vehicles Liability and Compulsory Personal Accident Insurance for buses, correspond to approximately 99% of Milli Re's total premium production in this branch and to nearly 4% of total local non-life premiums.

There was a significant rise in the premiums produced in General Liability Insurances as a result of the Compulsory Liability Insurance for Medical Malpractice Insurance that went into force on July 30, 2010. Milli Re serves as the only reinsurer in this recently introduced branch, and as such, attained 108% growth in General Liability branch.

The premium increase in General Liability Insurances in 2010 is 108%.

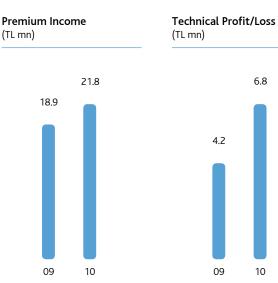
### Accident Insurances Excluding General Liability and Land Vehicles

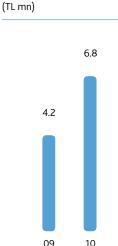
Milli Re posted a technical profit of TL 6.8 million in this branch in 2010.

A substantial portion of premium production is derived from Theft, Plate-Glass and Personal Accident branches. The expected premium increase is not achieved due to Theft and Plate-Glass covers given by an increasing number of insurers as extension to Fire policies with very low premiums. On the other hand, some premium growth was seen in the Personal Accident branch as a result of the increasing housing and consumer loans in connection with the economic recovery that started from the middle of 2010.

Milli Re generates 60% of its premium production, which went up by 15% year-on-year, in these branches from the local market. However, the branch accounts for 3% of total local non-life premiums.

### Agriculture

Owing to the Government Subsidized Agricultural Insurance policies managed by the Agricultural Insurance Pool (TARSIM) which began operations in 2006 upon the enforcement of the Agricultural Insurance Law, the premium production in this branch tends to increase year by year. Local premiums in this branch grew 12% in 2010.

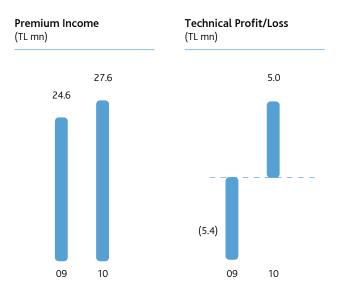
Another important contributor to the premium increase in this branch is the loan facilities offered by the state to agricultural producers, such as the loans extended to stockbreeders, as well as the positive effects the foundation of TARSIM had on the development of Agriculture insurances.

Accounting for 4% of total local non-life premium of Milli Re, the Agriculture branch is subject to a new method of setting aside provisions for unearned premiums, which was revised pursuant to the Undersecretariat of Treasury's Sector Announcement dated December 24, 2009 concerning the Provision for Unearned Premiums Calculated for Business Received from Agricultural Insurance Pool; as such, the Agriculture branch posted a positive result in 2010.

79% of Milli Re's premium production in Agriculture was derived from the local market.

In 2010, there was 12% increase in local premiums in this branch.

#### Health

Premiums in health insurances grew nearly by 18% in 2010.

Representing a branch that has been producing loss for many years for the Turkish insurance industry, Health is the fourth largest branch with 14% share in total non-life premium production. For this reason, the branch has negative effects on the financial structures of insurance companies.

As of 2010, Milli Re's local Health book constituted nearly 14% of total local non-life premium production.

Due to the technical loss arising from the very high loss ratios over the years, Milli Re for the last couple of years adopted a policy to withdraw or cut back from loss yielding reinsurance agreements.

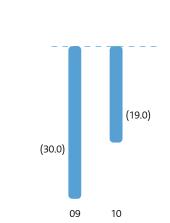
18% increase in premiums and the significant decline in technical loss in 2010 is the direct result of the policy to withdraw from loss-producing contracts.

Milli Re generates 91% of its premium production in the Health branch from the local market.

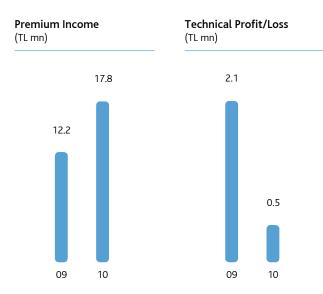


Approximately 15% of the total premium production in the Turkish insurance industry is derived from Life insurances, in which Milli Re's premiums account for 3%. The key reason behind this is the fact that cessions made to Milli Re cover not the endowment policies, but only the risk element.

In 2010, Milli Re's premium production on the Life branch was derived from the local market in its entirety. 45% premium increase in this branch is a result of booking of premiums relating to four quarters this year, as opposed to the three-quarter booking done in the prior year.

### **Foreign Acceptances**

Premium income from foreign acceptances amounted to TL 171.6 million at year-end 2010. Milli Re started playing an even more active role in the international reinsurance markets, particularly since 2006, for the purpose of maintaining the existing premium volume, and of improving technical profitability by attaining diversification in its portfolio.

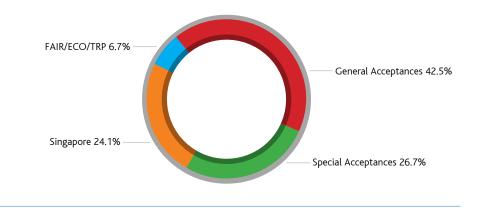
A greater portion of the developing foreign portfolio is made up of acceptances from African and Asian countries, which fall under the scope of the FAIR Reinsurance Pool that has been managed by Milli Re since its establishment in 1974.

In addition to this, by providing reinsurance capacity to select Continental European and Lloyd's market players most of which already have longstanding relationship with Milli Re through the retrocession programmes, Milli Re has further enhanced the diversification of the international portfolio. Similarly, Milli Re Singapore branch, which actively started accepting business in 2008, continues to work efficiently in the Asia-Pacific that presents significant potential.

Overseas businesses underwritten by Milli Re are categorized under four main groups:

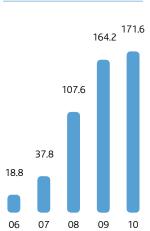

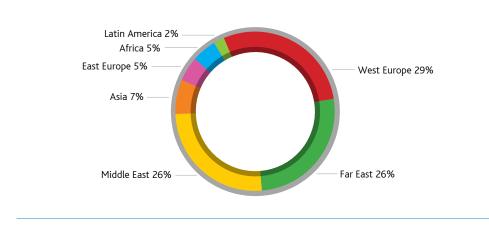

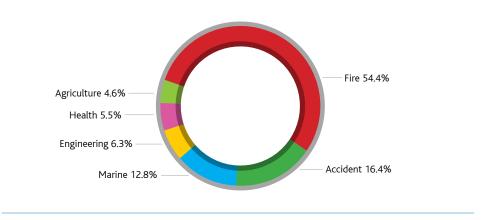






Geographic Breakdown of Foreign Acceptances by Locations of Ceding Companies

# Common characteristics of emerging markets and developments in these markets

Holding an important place within Milli Re's foreign acceptances, emerging markets share some common characteristics including rapid economic growth, increasing investments in infrastructure, low insurance penetration and density ratios, significant share non-life insurances have in the portfolios of companies, and excessive competition.

Major common characteristics on the reinsurance front of the markets include the low retention ratios of insurance companies, widespread use of proportional reinsurance methods, and the constant growth in reinsurance capacity.

Emerging markets hold an important place within Milli Re's foreign acceptances.

Some characteristics and developments concerning various emerging markets in 2010 are presented below:

Middle East: Penetration of new reinsurers, combined with the tendency of existing reinsurers' to increase their shares, lead to softening in the markets, excessive competition and price reductions in the Middle East markets where Milli Re pursues activities intensely.

Not even the loss payouts that resulted from the Gonu cyclone of 2006 or the Phet cyclone of 2010 could change this trend. Therefore, many insurance companies were unable to materialize their estimated premium incomes set out in their reinsurance treaties. On the other hand, the customary opinion that the region is not exposed to natural disasters other than the earthquake peril in certain countries (Iran, Lebanon, Jordan) has been shattered to a large extent with the flood and cyclone disasters that occurred in the recent years in Saudi Arabia and Omman.

North Africa: The recent tendency in the North African markets to diversify the panel of reinsurers and to give smaller shares to a greater number of reinsurers continued in 2010. The most noteworthy development in this region was the Compulsory Cession Ratio that was increased from 10% to 50% in Algeria.

**Eastern Europe / Russia**: Majority of the shares in the insurance companies in Eastern European countries are acquired by Western Europe's major insurance/reinsurance groups, which results in the panels of reinsurers of those insurance companies to fall under the scope of the said groups. On the other hand, the cost of the Koncordia fire damage on June 11, 2010 to the insurance industry amounted to USD 95 million. Milli Re's responsibility in this loss was worth approximately USD 1.5 million.

Far East: China and South Korea gain weight within businesses from this region which are accepted by Milli Re's Singapore Branch.

The need for additional reinsurance capacity in China will grow in the years ahead, due to the increase of insurance penetration across the country owing to the new arrangements imposed by China Insurance Regulatory Commission (CIRC), and with the introduction of modeling techniques concerning natural disasters. A series of flood damages that occurred from May until August 2010 caused an economic loss worth approximately USD 40 billion to the country. However, a very low portion of this loss was reflected to the insurance and reinsurance companies due to the very low ratio of insured assets.

The Financial Supervisory Service (FSS) that regulates the insurance industry in South Korea refers insurance companies to reinsurers that are assigned a credit rating of A. The typhoon Kompasu that hit the country by early September 2010 caused an economic loss of approximately USD 500 million, and an insured loss of USD 125 million, but its reflection on reinsurance treaties remained restricted to the first layers of excess of loss coverage.

On the other hand, with a view to diversifying its premium portfolio, Milli Re has been participating in the contracts on quota share basis of certain Lloyd's syndicates and also in proportional/non-proportional treaties of some companies from developed European countries since 2007.

Milli Re pursues a conservative underwriting strategy in terms of Special Acceptances and tries to avoid long-tail business and to limit US exposure as far as possible. Due to growing worldwide catastrophe book of business, Milli Re sustained some losses from market impacting natural catastrophes in 2010 such as the Chilean Earthquake on 27 February, Xynthia Windstorm (26 February-1 March) New Zealand Earthquake on 4 September and floods in Central and Eastern Europe during the year. Based on loss advices and industry figures Milli Re estimates an overall liability of USD 15 million to USD 20 million from these events.

### An Evaluation of 2010 Financial Results

In accordance with the new Uniform Chart of Accounts for the Insurance Industry, which came into effect on January 1, 2005, a portion of the financial income and expense items for the year 2010 was transferred to the technical accounts for the related branches. Detailed information on this implementation is presented in the section entitled "Notes to the Financial Statements for 2010" of this Annual Report.

When the transfer mentioned above is not taken into account for the sake of a healthy evaluation of financial results, in 2010, our Company's;

- financial income declined by 24% year-to-year to TL 158.9 million. This was due to the significant decrease in interest and exchange gains which resulted from the decreased interest rates and exchange rates with the effect of positive developments that occurred particularly in domestic financial markets;

- financial expenses went down by 15.65% to TL 35.8 million, in connection with the Company's reduced tax obligations that paralleled the decline in the profit for the period;

- general expenses grew 10.02% year-to-year and reached TL 41.8 million as a result of the reasonable level of overhead costs during the reporting period.

At the bottom line, Milli Re's financial profit before transfer in 2010 dwindled by 36.47% as compared with the 2009 figure and stood at TL 81.3 million.

### **Corporate Social Responsibility**

Offering music-lovers universal polyphonic music, which enriches our cultural life through concerts and recitals, the Milli Re Chamber Orchestra performs at the concert hall in the Milli Re building between September and May every year.

Considering social responsibility projects as an effort to create an added value to the insurance industry and the community, Milli Re undertakes such duties particularly in the fields of education, culture, art and sport, and demonstrates its commitment to society in the most effective manner through concrete projects and sponsorships.

### The Milli Re Art Gallery

The Milli Re Art Gallery is a pioneering institutional gallery set up within the framework of a corporate gallery management approach and widely known for its exhibitions and publications.

The story of the Milli Re Art Gallery started in 1994 when Milli Re has reserved a section of its business complex in Teşvikiye for cultural activities, and it set aside room for a library, an auditorium and a gallery in this section.

During the past seventeen years, the Milli Re Art Gallery has organized more than 140 exhibitions, all of which were well received in art circles and followed with interest. The gallery has published approximately hundred books and catalogues with texts by famous Turkish and foreign authors and art critics.

The Milli Re Art Gallery also organizes exhibitions abroad (in countries such as Germany, Slovenia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Georgia and Finland) and the "Rural Architecture in the Eastern Black Sea Region" exhibition has been on display at many universities and international museums both in Turkey and abroad since 2005.

### Milli Re Chamber Orchestra

The Milli Re Chamber Orchestra, which is constituted of artists most of whom also follow their solo music careers, was established in 1996.

Having performed its first concert on April 10th, 1996, the Milli Re Chamber Orchestra has organized a number of successful concerts since its foundation with famous conductors and musicians from Turkey and abroad.

Offering music-lovers a range of polyphonic universal music and enriching our cultural life through concerts and recitals, the Milli Re Chamber Orchestra performs at the concert hall in the Milli Re building between September and May every year.

In addition to the regularly performed concerts, the Orchestra, which has joined various national and international festivals, published the following CDs: "Romantic Era Strings Music" and "Şensoy Plays Tura".

Milli Re's sponsorship in the 34th, 36th and 38th Istanbul Music Festivals, held in 2006, 2008 and 2010 respectively, is another example of its devoted support for art.

### Miltaş Sports Complex

The Miltaş Sports Complex has been serving the insurance sector since 1986 with its facilities in various sports, particularly tennis. The International Insurance Tennis Tournament has been held every June at this Complex since 1986, providing a unique environment for local and foreign reinsurers and brokers. Tennis and basketball courses are also organized every year for youngsters in this Complex.



### Milli Re Library

The Milli Re Library is a specialized library in which publications, periodicals and other materials concerning the insurance industry and matters related to the insurance industry are collected, organized and put to the service of users under a modern information and document management approach.

Milli Re Library is the sector's most extensive library in terms of books and periodicals. The library also supports the libraries of Insurance Vocational Schools of Higher Education, which were established or are in the process of being established in Turkey, by sending books and periodicals.

### Reasürör Magazine

Published every three months since 1991, the Reasürör Magazine provides full academic content including compilations, translations, interviews, and statistical information in a variety of branches. The Reasürör Magazine can be considered as a valuable scientific resource, where the industry and students at various levels receiving education in the insurance field benefit in their studies.

### Turkish Insurance Institute Foundation (TII)

The Turkish Insurance Institute Foundation (TII) was established jointly by Milli Re and the Association of Turkish Insurance and Reinsurance Companies on May 29, 1970. To serve the insurance industry in the best possible manner, the Institute's Board is composed of two representatives of Milli Re and two representatives from the Association of Turkish Insurance and Reinsurance Companies, as well as one representative from the Insurance General Directorate of the Undersecretariat of Turkish Treasury, one academician and one individual from the sector deemed to have knowledge and experience.

The TII performs activities aimed at increasing the competitive strength of the insurance industry and to support its development. Since its foundation, the TII has established an education program in cooperation with universities aimed at meeting the vocational training needs of the insurance industry, it has conducted studies in insurance-related matters, published auxiliary works such as compilations and translations and established relations with local and foreign education institutions aimed at widening insurance education and raising insurance awareness.

Since 1970, the TII opens an annual long-term insurance business program titled "Basic Insurance Training Program", which has graduated 2,651 people so far. In addition, the Foundation is instrumental in the training of nearly 1,100 people every year through its short-term training programs organized in various topics, regulatory training programs, corporate trainings and advanced insurance programs. Approximately 30% of the personnel employed in the industry have attended TII training programs.

In addition, undertaking the simultaneous execution of the "Compulsory Training for Insurance Agents Technical Personnel" at 18 provinces, the TII gave 40,000 people access to training under the program, which started in 2009 and was completed in 2010 with additional training modules.

Working in close cooperation with leading training institutions in the global insurance industry, the TII provides an excellent library for the use of researchers, has a large collection of publications received from these institutions.

Apart from training services, the TII provides significant contributions to widening insurance knowledge through seminars and panels, which enjoy high levels of participation and popularity in the industry.

Having always attached significant importance to education, Milli Re has shown extensive efforts to provide, material and moral support, to TII's education activities - and will continue to do so going forward.

Having placed significant importance on education at all times, Milli Re has shown extensive efforts to provide material and moral support to TII's training activities, and will continue to do so in the future.

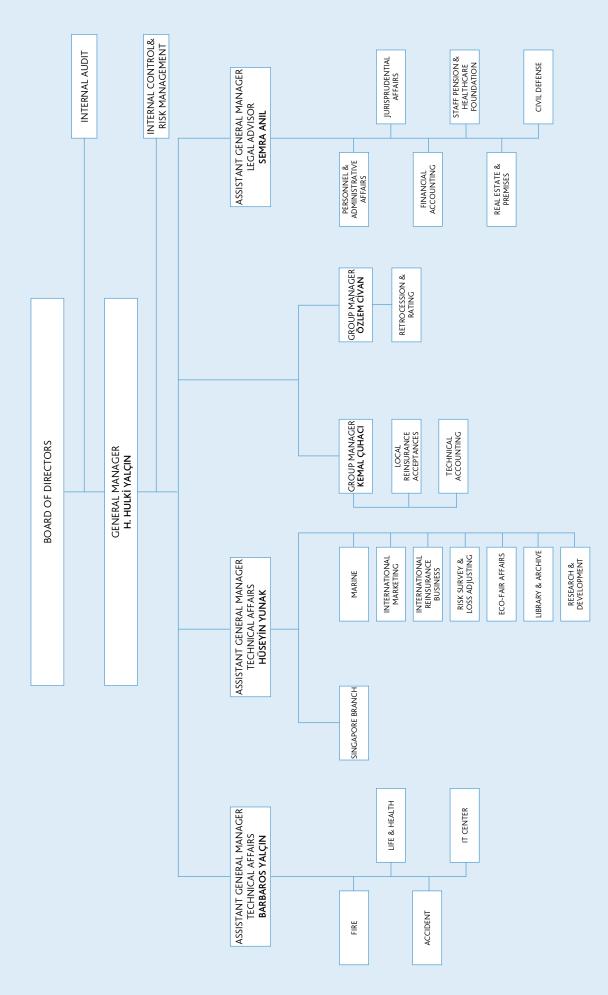

#### Summary Report by the Board of Directors

#### Distinguished Shareholders,

We respectfully present for your Esteemed Assembly's perusal and approval the balance sheet, income statement, profit distribution chart, statement of changes in equity, and cash flow statement showing the results achieved in 2010 marking the Company's 82<sup>nd</sup> year of operation, which are tabulated in line with the provisions of applicable legislation and the principles and guidelines set by the Turkish Treasury.

The financial crisis, which broke out by late 2008 in the USA and affected particularly developed Western country economies, bore some negative impacts upon our country as well; the recovery that started from the middle of 2010 led to positive developments in Turkey's economic and financial indicators for 2010.

These positive economic developments were paralleled by the repercussions in the Turkish insurance industry, which was able to attain real growth by registering approximately 13% growth in premium production, despite the price-based excessive competitive conditions that negatively impact premium income. It is believed that this result was contributed by the Turkish Treasury's new regulations aimed at adoption of measures against the factors that negatively affect the financial structures of insurance companies, which were enforced during 2010. However, it can be suggested that insurance companies had a really bad year in terms of profitability due to reduced financial income derived particularly on interest-backed financial investments with the effect of the ongoing economic conditions abroad, in addition to technical profitability which suffers decline because of the price-based excessive competition.

Many natural disasters occurred across the world during 2010, leading to material damage and loss of lives. The earthquakes that struck Chile and New Zealand, Winter Storm Xynthia in Western Europe, flood disasters in Central and Eastern Europe and Australia caused significant insured loss because of the high ratio of insurance penetration in these geographies, whereas the flood disaster in Pakistan and the earthquake in Haiti resulted in very high death tolls. Despite these negativities, favorable conditions persisted in the global reinsurance market in 2010 thanks to increased reinsurance supply in connection with capital surplus, as well as the positive results attained by market-making reinsurers in 2009.

Accepting business from international markets although it is a local reinsurer, our Company's total premium production increased by nearly 4% during 2010 and reached TL 855.3 million. TL 683.7 million that corresponds to 80% of this amount had been generated on the local market, whereas TL 171.6 million that makes up 20% of the same had been derived on foreign acceptances.

Despite the adverse conditions arising from various factors including the continued rise in the number of companies backed by foreign capital operating in the Turkish insurance industry in 2010, price-based excessive competition, and the policy to withdraw from poorly performing branches such as Land Vehicles and Health, our Company closed 2010 posting TL 64.1 million in profit for the period. The Company's total assets reached TL 1,621 million and its shareholders' equity rose to TL 799 million as at year-end 2010.

The Company's existing paid-in capital was raised to TL 525 million with the 2010 capital increase worth TL 140 million. With the acquisition of 35.53% stake in the capital of Anadolu Sigorta, one of the largest companies in the Turkish insurance market and owned by the same investment group with us, our total shareholding in this company went up to 57.31%.

This activity in the Turkish insurance market that is highly dynamic in terms of capital structure is anticipated to persist in the years ahead, and the foreign capital is expected to increase its concentration in the market gradually both through acquisitions and mergers. Despite this forecast, it is targeted to maintain the customary leadership and market share of our Company, which is the only local reinsurer in our market, in the Turkish reinsurance market. In addition, the stable performance will be sustained in our foreign acceptances, which achieved a significant premium volume in as short a period of time as three years, and geographical diversification will be carried on in the underwriting portfolio, while making the Company's reinsurance capacity available to international markets.

We extend our thanks to our esteemed shareholders and our employees who were the greatest contributors in maintaining our Company's prestige and reliability earned and built on over the course of 82 years of operation and in its efforts to be a preferred business partner for its solid financial structure, as well as for the abovementioned qualities.

During 2010, the impacts of the global crisis that continued over the course of the previous years lessened and economic conditions showed some betterment. However, the said improvement did not reflect on the balance sheet profits of the insurance industry. In view of this challenging process the industry went through, efficient and productive conduct of the Company's activities has been vital. With this perspective, the Internal Audit Department's policy focused on providing an independent and objective assurance and training service seeking to advance the Company's activities and to contribute value to them, rather than serving as a strict auditing and error finding tool.

To ensure that its activities are conducted independently and objectively, the Internal Audit Department reports directly to the Board of Directors.

The purpose of internal audit is to ensure that the work and transactions of the Company are carried out in accordance with the current legislation, as well as the Company's internal guidelines, its management strategy and policy; and to detect and to prevent any irregularities, mistakes, or fraud through continuous monitoring.

Internal audit activities include the assessment of the effectiveness of risk management processes and of internal controls formulated to manage risks, and they further build on the same.

All conclusions should be based on material proofs to the extent possible. In cases where material proofs cannot be obtained, the policy is to explain the reasons why that conclusion is drawn. It is important to be objective and reasonable.

In 2010, the Internal Audit Department has completed on-site inspection of all departments of the Company and the Singapore Branch carrying out the reinsurance business in the Asia-Pacific region, by way of observation, interview and data analysis. Audit performed revealed no issues that might have an adverse impact on the Company's financial structure.

The Internal Audit Department works to increase the effectiveness of the internal audit practices in the company every year with the support and approval of the management and cooperation of the employees in fulfilling the purpose of developing the company's activities and adding value to them. According to the Turkish Treasury's "Regulation on the Internal Systems of Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies", published in the Official Gazette on 21 June 2008 with an issue number 26913, "Internal Control and Risk Management Department", which will report to the General Manager of the Company and perform its activities under his directorship, was established.

The Internal Control and Risk Management Department is a double-functioning department responsible for the execution of Internal Control and Risk Management activities in the Company. Practices of this department within the scope of respective regulations, policies, procedures and principles are summarized under two headings.

### **Internal Control Practices**

Internal control system has an important role in ensuring the sound performance in the Company's operations, within the framework of such principles as efficiency, productivity, compliance and reliability, in order to protect it against undesired situations and to minimize negative impacts, if any, given that any event in the world may affect all countries and economies at the same time, due to the nature of globalization.

In respect to the Internal Control System, "Regulative Framework on the Internal Control Activities", "Internal Control Policies" and "Implementation Procedures and Principles of the Internal Control" were approved at the Board of Directors meeting dated 26 February 2009 (with meeting number, 1119)

To ensure the sound performance of the Internal Control operations, the "Control Center" was set up with the establishment of the "Internal Control and Risk Management Department" and the "Control Environment" was created with the commissioning of the Company's staff within the scope of these operations.

The purpose of the Internal Control Policies is to ensure that the Company's assets are well-protected; its activities are carried out efficiently and effectively and in adherence to the Company regulations and policies, and also to the Customs of Insurance Industry. Reliability, consistency and integrity of accounting and financial reporting systems and prompt accessibility of the information within the organization are also aimed by the overall internal control scheme and associated policies. In conjunction with this overall purpose, internal control activities encapsulate the company's core operational activities and any processes related to those operational activities; communication channels and information systems; financial reporting systems; and internal consistency and compatibility of the Company.

The Internal Control Group consists of 21 people, out of whom 2 are located in the Control Centre and 19 are in the control environment. Internal control activities include daily, weekly, monthly, quarterly and annual checks and controls in the core control areas.

Responsibilities, authorities and limit delegations of staff are all documented in the relevant implementation procedures, flowcharts, and job descriptions. These documents are continuously reviewed and updated according to the changing needs, requirements, circumstances and identified risks.

The compliance of the main and other activities of underwriting departments, technical and financial accounting, payments and expenses, financial tables and reports within the cession and retrocession performed by treaty and voluntary methods to the legal liabilities, Company policies and application principles are mentioned.

The Internal Control and Risk Management Department, subordinated to the General Manager, is responsible to share the outcomes of Risk Notification Reports, which are generated as a consequence of internal control activities as described above, and make necessary co-assessments with the pertinent staff involved in the relevant departments. In this way, preemptive and complementary actions can be taken rapidly and also developmental longer-term solutions and methods to introduce better practices can be identified, with an objective to increase overall company performance. The evaluations that include a summary of views and suggestions of the Internal Control and Risk Management Department are reported to the General Manager with the "Internal Control Report". The evaluations and outcomes as of such internal control activities are also reviewed regularly by the Board of Directors.

#### **Risk Management Practices**

Given the risk-focused nature of the insurance business, insurance and reinsurance companies inevitably establish Risk Management Systems and Processes, and systematically and closely monitor risk exposure. Therefore, the Company has been implementing risk management techniques for many years; development of these techniques has gained even greater importance due to the recent adverse developments in the Turkish and worldwide financial markets, as well as because of the unforeseen natural disasters that occurred. In respect to the Risk Management System, "Regulative Framework on the Risk Management Activities", "Risk Management Policies" and "Implementation Procedures and Principles of the Risk Management" were revised at the Board of Directors meeting dated 26 February 2009 (with meeting number, 1119).

The aim of the risk management system is to define the risks arising from the Company's activities, to determine related limits, to measure, monitor, control the risks effectively, to take necessary precautions and to do the necessary reporting to related authorities, as well as to protect Milli Re's reputation and to ensure that liabilities to insurance companies are fulfilled accurately and on time.

The function of the Risk Committee, which is established for the purpose of determining risk management strategies and policies that the Company will follow and submitting them to the Board of Directors for approval, is to evaluate the activities of Risk Management Function within the Internal Control and Risk Management Department based on the "Application Principles In Respect of Risk Limits" and to monitor the implementation of these guidelines throughout the Company.

The "Risk Catalogue", which aims to form a common terminology within the Company, in which possible risks are classified and defined by examples and which is up-dated once in a year, and the "Risk Management Guide", which includes the organization of the Risk Management function, possible risks and their measurement methods, are updated every year in accordance with the activities of the Company and approved to the Board of Directors.

Moreover, types and definitions of the risks that the Company may be exposed to, measurement methods of these risks, risk limits and plans in case of limit violations are detailed in the "Application Principles In Respect of Risk Limits" which is approved by the Board of Directors and updated consistently.

The duties and responsibilities of the Internal Control and Risk Management Department, which is a separate body, independent of the executive functions, are as follows in respect of risk management:

• To determine, define, measure, monitor and control risks

• To determine the risk management principles, procedures and policies predicated on the risk management strategies and to submit them to the Risk Committee

• To declare risk management principles, procedures and policies throughout the Company

• To provide the implementation of the policies and compliance with them

• To develop risk management techniques and methods, to ensure that risks are within the determined limits and to monitor limit violations, if any, and

• To carry out reporting and announcement activities in respect of risk management

### **Basic Risks and Measuring Methods**

Risks that the Company is and/or may be exposed to are classified under two headings - financial and non-financial risks and explanations regarding the definitions and assessment methods of basis risks are stated below.

### **FINANCIAL RISKS**

#### **Reinsurance Risk**

This risk arises from the inaccurate and inefficient application of reinsurance techniques in the process of making profit by underwriting and retrocession activities.

In order to keep it under control, which cannot be expressed as a numerical value, the Application Principles In Respect of Risk Limits where underwriting limits, related implementations and retention limits are stated, is revised regularly.

Underwriting limits, risk profiles and accumulation that may occur in the event of a catastrophe risk are taken into consideration when preparing retrocession agreements for the purpose of covering the liabilities arising from underwritten business. The largest risk faced by the Company is the earthquake risk stemming from domestic acceptances. In respect of this risk, the results of the dynamic financial analysis performed by using the Company's internal modeling are assessed. It is ensured that, the difference between the estimated gross loss amount obtained as a result of the financial analysis and the coverage limit of retrocession agreement and total equalization reserve is in compliance with the limits.

### **Credit Risk**

This risk expresses the probability of loss arising from the full or partial default of the counterparties (security issuers, insurance/reinsurance companies, debt owners) with which the Company has a business relationship.

Regarding this risk, which is measured by both quantitative and qualitative methods, the weighted reinsurers in retrocession programs, credit ratings of them that indicate their financial strengths and their financial positions are analyzed.

On the other hand, over-due receivables and the distribution of Company's investment portfolio in terms of counterparties are monitored regularly.

### Market Risk

This risk refers to the probability of loss which may occur in the value of the Company's positions in respect of financial borrowing instruments of which the returns are associated with interest rates, stocks, other securities, derivative contracts based on these instruments, as well as Company's all FX denominated assets and liabilities in various currencies stated in the balance sheet and off-balance sheet items, due to volatilities in interest rates, stock prices and exchange rates.

Market Risk is measured by using a numerical method named Value at Risk (VaR). This method measures the expected "severe" loss amount of the portfolio appearing on a "day of crisis". The VaR of a portfolio represents the maximum loss which may arise in value of this portfolio that is retained for a definite period, as a result of volatilities arising in interest rates, exchange rates and stock prices, using a determined confidence level. While calculating Value at Risk of the Company's portfolio, Historical Simulation Method, which creates different scenarios by using the past data, is applied and a historical data of 250 working days, a confidence level of 99% and a holding period of one day are taken as basis.

Value at Risk is calculated on a daily basis and the results of the measurement are verified by Back Tests. In addition, the Stress Tests which are applied quarterly are the supporting factors of Value at Risk method in calculating the loss caused by unexpected and extraordinary situations and also by Scenario Analysis different scenarios are created for the purpose of monitoring the sensitivity of the Company portfolio to the changes in basic risk factors.

Market Risk limits are determined by the ratio of VaR to the Investment Portfolio Value and to Shareholders' Equity and stated in "Application Principles In Respect of Risk Limits" ". Limit violations are monitored regularly.

#### Liquidity Risk

This risk denotes the imbalance between the Company's cash inflows and outflows in terms of maturity and volume. Liquidity Risk takes place if the Company is not able to access enough funds in order to fulfill its commitments and liabilities when big losses occur and to pay the insurance companies' immediate cash claims.

In respect of this risk which is measured by quantitative methods, any liquidity deficit is observed via the maturity analysis of assets and liabilities in the balance sheet. (Asset / Liability Duration Matching) Moreover, the Company's liquidity structure is monitored by using the following basic indicators determined by the Undersecretariat of Turkish Treasury in respect to Liquidity Ratios:

- Liquid Assets/Total Assets
- Liquidity Ratio
- Current Ratio
- Premium and Reinsurance Receivables/Total Assets

Developments of these ratios in comparison to the previous year are monitored regularly.

### **NON-FINANCIAL RISKS**

### **Operational Environment Risk**

This risk is defined as the negative impact on the operational ability of the company, due to the external factors in Company's operating areas such as political, economic, demographic conditions.

Qualitative methods are used to measure this risk. On the basis of "Self Assessment Methodology", "Questionnaire" and/or "Interview" methods are used to determine the impact and probability level of the risk as "High", "Reasonable" or "Low".

Moreover, underwriting portfolio is monitored regularly during the year to see if there is an acceptance from a country that is defined as "unapproved" territory. On the other hand, the countries which the underwriting portfolio is concentrated in are identified and the ratings of these countries are studied.

### **Strategy Risk**

This risk arises due to the inefficient managerial and organizational structure of the Company, inability of the management to develop effective strategies or non-disclosure and/or lack of implementation of these strategies, erroneous business decisions, improper application of decisions or noncompliance with the changing market dynamics.

Qualitative methods are used to measure the level of this risk. On the basis of "Self Assessment Methodology", "Questionnaire" and/or "Interview" methods are used to determine the impact and probability level of the risk as "High", "Reasonable" or "Low".

### **Model Risk**

This risk expresses the probability of loss that may occur if the models used within the Company's scope of business and/or risk measurement processes are inappropriately designed or not properly implemented, or the conclusions derived by the models are inadequate or incorrect.

The probability of loss, due to production of inaccurate and inadequate results in Company's current models which are used to calculate the Market Risk and the Catastrophe Risk, is considered under this risk category.

In the measurement and evaluation of Model Risk, "Questionnaire" and/or "Interview" methods are used on the basis of "Self Assessment Methodology", to determine the impact and probability level of the risk as "High", "Reasonable" or "Low".

### **Operational Risk**

This risk expresses the probable losses arising from inappropriate or inoperative business processes, human errors, technological or infrastructural interruptions, business interruption, changes in management or processes, inaccurate internal / external reporting or external factors occurring while the Company conducts its basic functions necessary for the continuation of business.

Qualitative and quantitative methods are used together in measuring the operational risks.

Factor Based Standard Approach, which is developed under Solvency II framework, is applied as a quantitative method. In this method, the required capital for operational risks is calculated via multiplying Gross Technical Provisions and Gross Earned Premiums by the factors in respect of the branches they are related to.

"Self Assessment Methodology", which allows the risks related to activities conducted, to be determined via participation of staff who is performing such activities, is applied as a qualitative method. The level of the operational risk that the Company is exposed to is subsequently classified as "High", "Requiring Precautionary Measures" or "Acceptable", depending on the result of the assessments.

#### **Reputation Risk**

This risk can be defined as the probable loss of confidence of counterparties or damage to the "Company Reputation" resulting from failures in the performance of the Company or noncompliance with the current regulations.

Qualitative methods are used to measure the level of this risk. On the basis of "Self Assessment Methodology", "Questionnaire" and/or "Interview" methods are used to determine the impact and probability level of the risk as "High", "Reasonable" or "Low".

All findings obtained as a result of measuring the above-mentioned risks, all analyses and assessments regarding these findings, are reported to the General Manager, Risk Committee and Board of Directors, as well as to the Directorate of Subsidiaries and Directorate of Risk Management of İşbank by the Internal Control and Risk Management Department regularly.

If the impact and probability level of the risks is found "high", the Board of Directors determines an action plan regarding the necessary transactions.

### Assessment of the Capital Adequacy

The Company's capital adequacy is measured according to the provisions of "Regulation In Respect of Measurement and Assessment of Capital Adequacy of Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies", which was published by Undersecretariat of Turkish Treasury and assessments regarding the results are first submitted to the Risk Committee via the "Risk Assessment Report" and after the approval of the committee, submitted to the Board of Directors. The factor-based method, used according to the said regulation, is a method which determines the amount of capital defined in the regulation as per each type of risk and thus allows the calculation of the total required capital.

### Introduction

We have audited the accompanying unconsolidated balance sheet of Milli Reasürans Türk Anonim Şirketi ("the Company") as at 31 December 2010 and the related unconsolidated statements of income, unconsolidated statement of changes in equity and unconsolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these unconsolidated financial statements in accordance with the accounting principles and standards in force as per the insurance legislation. An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on our judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, we consider internal systems relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal system. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting principles used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

### Independent Auditors' Opinion

In our opinion, the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of Milli Reasürans Türk Anonim Şirketi as at 31 December 2010, and of its unconsolidated financial performance and its unconsolidated cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting principles and standards (see *Note 2*) in force as per the insurance legislation.

**1** General information

#### 1.1 Name of the Company and the ultimate owner of the group

As at 31 December 2010, the shareholder having direct or indirect control over the shares of Millî Reasürans Türk Anonim Şirketi ("the Company") is Türkiye İş Bankası AŞ Group ("İş Bankası") having 76.64% of the outstanding shares.

The Company was established in 26 February 1929 and has been operating since in 19 July 1929.

1.2 Domicile and the legal structure of the Company, country and the address of the registered office (address of the operating center if it is different from the registered office)

The Company was registered in Turkey in 16 July 1929 and has the status of 'Incorporated Company'. The address of the Company's registered office is Maçka Cad. No: 35 34367 Şişli İstanbul.

1.3 Business of the Company

The Company is primarily engaged in reinsurance and retrocession businesses in domestic and international markets. In 2007, the Company opened a branch in Singapore upon the completion of the necessary local formalities according to the local legislation. Singapore branch has been operating since 2008.

#### 1.4 Description of the main operations of the Company

The Company conducts its operations in accordance with the Insurance Law No.5684 (the "Insurance Law") issued in 14 June 2007 dated and 26552 numbered Official Gazette and the communiqués and other regulations in force issued by the Turkish Treasury based on the Insurance Law.

The purpose and activities of the Company as stated at the Articles of Association of the Company are as follows.

• providing life and non-life reinsurance and other related products and services in all insurance branches and sub-branches to Turkish and foreign insurance companies;

• managing and participating in reinsurance operations of Pools,

• purchasing, selling, constructing and renting real estates,

• purchasing debt instruments and shares issued by all sorts of commercial, industrial and financial institutions and government agencies as well as providing capital or participating in the establishment of such institutions to provide a consistent, secure and adequate financial income,

· providing loans by obtaining real estates as collateral,

In addition to these, carrying out other operations upon recommendation by the Board of Directors and resolution of the General Meeting which are deemed to be beneficial and material for the Company and are not prohibited by the law.

#### 1.6 Wages and similar benefits provided to the senior management

For the year ended 31 December 2010, wages and similar benefits provided to the senior management including chairman, members of the board of the directors, general manager, general coordinator, and deputy general managers is amounting to TL 3,684,876 (31 December 2009: TL 3,412,734).

1.7 Keys used in the distribution of investment income and operating expenses (personnel, administrative, research and development, marketing and selling, services rendered from third parties and other operating expenses) in the financial statements

Procedures and principles related to keys used in the financial statements of the companies are determined in accordance with the 4 January 2008 dated and 2008/1 numbered "Communiqué Related to the Procedures and Principles for the Keys Used in the Financial Statements Being Prepared In Accordance With Insurance Accounting Plan" issued by the Turkish Treasury.

In accordance with the above mentioned Communiqué, insurance and reinsurance companies are allowed to transfer technical section operating expense to insurance section through methods determined by Turkish Treasury or by the Company itself. In accordance with the approval of the Undersecretariat of Treasury, dated 6 March 2008 and numbered 10222, known and exactly distinguishable operating expenses are distributed to related branches directly and services rendered from third parties and other operating expenses in accordance with the gross premiums written for the last three years.

Income from the assets invested against non-life technical provisions is transferred to technical section from non-technical section, remaining income is transferred to the non-technical section. Expenses are distributed to the sub-branches in accordance with the percentage calculated by dividing "net cash flow" to the "total net cash flow", cash flow being net of reinsurer share and calculated by deducting net losses paid from net written premiums.

Income from the assets invested against mathematical provisions is recorded under technical section, remaining income is transferred to the non-technical section.

#### 1.8 Information on the financial statements as to whether they comprise an individual company or a group of companies

The accompanying financial statements comprise only the unconsolidated financial information of the Company. As further discussed in note 2.2 - *Consolidation*, the Company has prepared consolidated financial statements as at 31 December 2010 separately.

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

#### 2.1.1 Information about the principles and the special accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements

The Company maintains its books of account and prepares its financial statements in accordance with the Turkish Accounting Standards ("TAS"), Turkish Financial Reporting Standards ("TFRS"), and other accounting and financial reporting principles, statements and guidance (collectively "the Reporting Standards") in accordance with the "Communiqué Related to the Financial Reporting of Insurance, Reinsurance, and Individual Pension Companies" as promulgated by the Turkish Treasury based on Article 18 of the Insurance Law and Article 11 of the Individual Pension Law.

In Article 4 of the related communiqué; it is stated that procedures and principles related to accounting of insurance contracts, subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures and presentation of unconsolidated and consolidated financial statements together with their explanatory notes which will be announced to the public will be determined by the further communiqués of the Turkish Treasury.

Although the 4<sup>th</sup> standard of the Turkish Accounting Standards Board ("TASB") for the '*Insurance contracts*' became effective on 25 March 2006 for the accounting periods that begin on or after 31 December 2005, it is stated that TFRS 4 will not be implemented at this stage since the second phase of the International Accounting Standards Board project about the insurance contracts has not been completed yet. In this context, "Communiqué on Technical Reserves for Insurance, Reinsurance and Individual Pension Companies and the Related Assets That Should Be Invested Against Those Technical Reserves" ("Communiqué on Technical Reserves") is published in the Official Gazette dated 7 August 2007, numbered 26606 and became effective on 1 January 2008. Subsequent to the publication of the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, some other circulars and sector announcements which contain explanations and regulations related to application of the Communiqué on Technical Reserves are published. Accounting policies applied for the insurance contracts based on these communiqué, circulars and other sector announcements are summarized on their own captions in the following sections.

Accounting for subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures is regulated with 28 December 2007 dated and 2007/26 numbered "Circular Related to the Accounting of Subsidiaries, Associates and Joint Ventures", issued by the Turkish Treasury. It is stated that, the companies will continue to apply the principles of the related standards of TFRSs for the accounting of subsidiaries, associates and joint venture until the publication of another regulation on this issue by the Turkish Treasury. "Circular Related to the Preparation of the Consolidated Financial Statements of Insurance, Reinsurance, and Individual Pension Companies" issued by the Turkish Treasury in the 31 December 2008 dated and 27097 numbered (4<sup>th</sup> repeat) Official Gazette, constituted the basis of consolidation to be effective on the dates that circular specifies.

In the 12 August 2008 dated and 2008/36 numbered "Sector Announcement Related to the Accounting of Subsidiaries, Associates and Joint Ventures in the Separate Financial Statements of Insurance, Reinsurance and Individual Pension Companies" issued by the Turkish Treasury, it is stated that although, insurance, reinsurance and individual pension companies are exempted from *TAS 27 – Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements*, subsidiaries, associates and joint-ventures could be accounted for in accordance with TAS 39 – *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* or at cost in accordance with the 37<sup>th</sup> paragraph of TAS 27 – *Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements*.

"Circular Related to the Presentation of Financial Statements", issued by the Turkish Treasury in the 18 April 2008 dated and 26851 numbered Official Gazette, regulates the content of the financial statements to make them comparable with the financial statements of previous periods and the other companies.

#### Additional paragraph for convenience translation to English

The differences between the accounting principles, as described in the preceding paragraphs, and the accounting principles generally accepted in countries, in which the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements are to be distributed, and International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"), may have significant influence on the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements. Accordingly, the accompanying unconsolidated financial position and results of operations in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in such countries other than Turkey and IFRS.

#### 2.1.2 Other accounting policies appropriate for the understanding of the financial statements

#### Accounting in hyperinflationary countries

Financial statements of the Turkish entities have been restated for the changes in the general purchasing power of the Turkish Lira based on "TAS 29 – *Financial Reporting in Hyperinflationary Economies*" as at 31 December 2004. *TAS 29* requires that financial statements prepared in the currency of a hyperinflationary economy be stated in terms of the measuring unit current at the reporting date, and that corresponding figures for previous years be restated in the same terms.

With respect to the declaration of the Turkish Treasury with the article dated 4 April 2005 and numbered 19387, financial statements as of 31 December 2004 are adjusted for the opening balances of 2005 in accordance with the section with respect to inflation accounting of the Capital Markets Board ("CMB") Communiqué No: 25 of Series XI, "Communiqué on Accounting Standards in Capital Market" published in the Official Gazette dated 15 January 2003 and numbered 25290. Inflation accounting is no longer applied starting from 1 January 2005, in accordance with the same declaration of the Turkish Treasury. Accordingly, as at 31 December 2009, non-monetary assets and liabilities and items included in shareholders' equity including paid-in capital recognized or recorded before 1 January 2005 are measured as restated to 31 December 2004 in order to reflect inflation adjustments. Non-monetary assets and liabilities and items included in shareholders' equity including paid-in capital recognized or recorded at their nominal values.

#### Other accounting policies

The Company recorded premiums, commissions and claims accruals based on the notifications sent by the insurance and reinsurance companies after the closing of their balances. Premiums, commissions and claims accruals are recorded in the accompanying financial statements with the three-month delay. Therefore, related income statement balances include last quarter results for the year ended 31 December 2009 and nine-month results as at and for the period ended 30 September 2010 and accordingly related balance sheet balances as at 31 December 2010 do not reflect the actual position. According to the letter dated 31 August 2010 and numbered B.02.1.HZN.0.10.03.01/42139 sent by the Turkish Treasury to the Company, it is stated that account statements sent by the ceding companies are subject to possible delays and the Turkish Treasury is considered special situations of the reinsurance companies in their regulations.

Information regarding other accounting polices is disclosed above in "Note 2.1.1 - *Information about the principles and the specific accounting policies used in the preparation of the financial statements*" and each under its own caption in the following sections of this report.

#### 2.1.3 Functional and presentation currency

The accompanying unconsolidated financial statements are presented in TL, which is the Company's functional currency.

2.1.4 Rounding scale of the amounts presented in the financial statements

Financial information presented in TL, has been rounded to the nearest TL values

#### 2.1.5 Basis of measurement used in the preparation of the financial statements

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis as adjusted for the effects of inflation that lasted until 31 December 2004, except for the financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, available-for-sale financial assets, derivative financial instruments and associates which are measured at their fair values unless reliable measures are available.

#### 2.1.6 Accounting policies, changes in accounting estimates and errors

The Company has identified errors over the financial statements prepared as at 31 December 2009 and 1 January 2009; the opening balance sheet of 31 December 2009. These errors have been corrected by restating the prior year financial statements in accordance with TAS 8 - *Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors*. The correction of error had the following impact on prior year financial statements and the opening balances.

Critical accounting judgements used in applying the Company's accounting policies are explained in 3 – *Critical accounting estimates and judgments in applying accounting policies*.

#### 2.2 Consolidation

"Circular Related to the Preparation of the Consolidated Financial Statements of Insurance, Reinsurance and Individual Pension Companies" issued by the Turkish Treasury in the Official Gazette dated 31 December 2008 and numbered 21097 ("the Circular for Consolidation") requires that insurance, reinsurance and individual pension companies issue consolidated financial statements starting from 31 March 2009.

In this context, Company's associate; Anadolu Anonim Türk Sigorta Şirketi ("Anadolu Sigorta") has been consolidated in the consolidated financial statements that are prepared separately.

In this context, financial statements of Anadolu Anonim Türk Sigorta Şirketi ("Anadolu Sigorta") that is the Company's subsidiary, consolidated by the equity method, furthermore, the consolidated financial statements are prepared.

The Company has not consolidated Miltaş Turizm A.Ş., the subsidiary of the Company, based on the exception specified in the Circular for Consolidation; as the amount of total assets of such subsidiary was below 1% of total assets of the Company. The Company accounted for this subsidiary at cost as of 31 December 2010 and 2009.

In the 12 August 2008 dated and 2008/36 numbered "Sector Announcement Related to the Accounting of Subsidiaries, Associates and Joint Ventures in the Stand Alone Financial Statements of Insurance, Reinsurance and Individual Pension Companies" of the Turkish Treasury, it is stated that although insurance, reinsurance and individual pension companies are exempted from TAS 27 – *Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements*, subsidiaries, associates and joint-ventures could be accounted in accordance with TAS 39 – *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement* or at cost in accordance with the 37th paragraph of TAS 27 – *Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements*. Parallel to the related sector announcements mentioned above, as at the reporting date the Company has accounted for its associate at fair value based on quoted market price.

#### 2.3 Segment reporting

An operating segment is a component of the Company that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses, including revenues and expenses that relate to transactions with any of the Company's other components, whose operating results are reviewed regularly by the Board of Directors (being chief operating decision maker) to make decisions about resources allocated to each segment and assess its performance, and for which discrete financial information is available. Since the main economic environment, where the Company operates, is Turkey, a geographical segment reporting has not been presented. Furthermore, the Company operates in life and non-life branches and detailed information for business segments has been presented in the accompanying unconsolidated statement of income.

#### 2.4 Foreign currency transactions

Transactions are recorded in TL, which is the Company's functional currency. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the reporting date and all exchange differences, except for those arising on the translation of the fair value change of available-for-sale financial assets, are offset and are recognized as foreign exchange gains or losses.

Changes in the fair value of financial assets denominated in foreign currency classified as available-for-sale are analysed between translation differences resulting from changes in the amortised cost of the asset and other changes in the carrying amount of the asset. Translation differences related to changes in amortised cost are recognized in profit or loss, and other changes in carrying amount are recognized in equity.

#### 2.5 Tangible assets

Tangible assets are recorded at their historical costs that have been adjusted according to the inflation rates until the end of 31 December 2004. There have been no other inflationary adjustments for these tangible assets for the following years and therefore they have been recorded at their costs indexed to the inflation rates for 31 December 2004. Tangible assets that have been purchased after 1 January 2005 have been recorded at their costs excluding their exchange rate differences and finance expenses less impairment losses if any.

Gains/losses arising from the disposal of the tangible assets are calculated as the difference between the net carrying value and the proceeds from the disposal of related tangible assets and reflected to the statement of income of the related year.

Maintenance and repair costs incurred in the ordinary course of the business are recorded as expense.

There are no pledges, mortgages and other encumbrances on tangible fixed assets.

There are no changes in accounting estimates that have significant effect on the current period or that are expected to have significant effect on the following periods.

Depreciation is recognized in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of each part of an item of tangible assets since this most closely reflects the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset. Depreciation rates and estimated useful lives are as follows:

#### 2.6 Investment property

Investment properties are held either to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation or for both.

Investment properties are measured initially at cost including transaction costs.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the Company measured all investment property based on the cost model in accordance with the cost model for property and equipment (i.e. at cost less accumulated depreciation and less impairment losses if any).

Depreciation is provided on investment properties on a straight line basis. Depreciation period for investment properties is 50 years for buildings and land is not depreciated.

Investment properties are derecognized when either they have been disposed of or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit is expected from its disposal. Any gains or losses on the retirement or disposal of an investment property are recognized in profit or loss in the period of retirement or disposal.

#### 2.7 Intangible assets

The Company's intangible assets consist of computer software.

Intangible assets are recorded at cost in compliance with the "TAS 38 – Accounting for intangible assets". The cost of the intangible assets purchased before 31 December 2004 are restated from the purchasing dates to 31 December 2004, the date the hyperinflationary period is considered to be ended. The intangible assets purchased after this date are recorded at their historical costs. Acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use the specific software.

Amortization is charged on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives (3-15 years) over the cost of the asset.

Costs associated with developing or maintaining computer software programs are recognized as expense when incurred. Costs that are directly associated with the development of identifiable and unique software products that are controlled by the Company and will probably provide more economic benefits than costs in one year are recognized as intangible assets. Costs include software development employee costs and an appropriate portion of relevant overheads. Computer software development costs recognized as assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives (not exceeding three years).

#### 2.8 Financial assets

A financial asset is any asset that is cash, an equity instrument of another entity, a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset from another entity; or to exchange financial assets or financial liabilities with another entity under conditions that are potentially favourable to the entity.

Securities are recognized and derecognized at the date of settlement.

Financial assets are classified in four categories; as financial assets held for trading, available-for-sale financial assets, held to maturity financial assets, and loans and receivables.

*Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss* are presented as financial assets held for trading in the accompanying financial statements and trading securities and derivatives are included in this category. Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss measured at their fair values and gain/loss arising due to changes in the fair values of related financial assets are recorded in the statement of income. Interest income earned on trading purpose financial assets and the difference between their fair values and acquisition costs are recorded as interest income in the statement of income. In case of disposal of such financial assets before their maturities, the gains/losses on such disposal are recorded under trading income/losses. Accounting policies of derivatives are detailed in note 2.10 – *Derivative financial instruments*.

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise when the Company provides money, goods or services directly to a debtor with no intention of trading the receivable. Loans and receivables those are not interest earning are measured by discounting of future cash flows less impairment losses, and interest earning loans and receivables are measured at amortized cost less impairment losses.

Held to maturity financial assets are the financial assets with fixed maturities and fixed or pre-determined payment schedules that the Company has the intent and ability to hold until maturity, excluding loans and receivables. Subsequent to initial recognition, held to maturity financial assets and loans and receivables are measured at amortized cost using effective interest rate method less impairment losses, if any.

Available-for-sale financial assets are the financial assets other than assets held for trading purposes, held-to-maturity financial assets and loans and receivables.

Available-for-sale financial assets are initially recorded at cost and subsequently measured at their fair values. Assets that are not traded in an active market are measured by valuation techniques, including recent market transactions in similar financial instruments, adjusted for factors unique to the instrument being valued; or discounted cash flow techniques for the assets which do not have a fixed maturity. Unrecognized gains or losses derived from the difference between their fair value and the discounted values calculated per effective interest rate method are recorded in "Revaluation of financial assets" under shareholders' equity. Upon disposal, the realized gain or losses are recognized directly in the statement of income.

The determination of fair values of financial instruments not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques. Observable market prices of the quoted financial instruments which are similar in terms of interest, maturity and other conditions are used in determining the fair value.

*Subsidiaries* are the entities that the Company has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of those so as to obtain benefits from its activities. Subsidiaries, traded in an active market or whose fair value can be reliably measured, are recorded at their fair values. Subsidiaries that are not traded in an active market and whose fair value cannot be reliably set are reflected in financial statements at their costs after deducting impairment losses, if any.

#### 2.9 Impairment on asset

#### Impairment on financial assets

Financial assets or group of financial assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is objective evidence of impairment. If any such indication exists, the Company estimates the amount of impairment. Impairment loss incurs if, and only if, there is objective evidence that the expected future cash flows of financial asset or group of financial assets are adversely affected by an event(s) ("loss event(s)") incurred subsequent to recognition. The losses expected to incur due to future events are not recognized even if the probability of loss is high.

Loans and receivables are presented net of specific allowances for uncollectibility. Specific allowances are made against the carrying amounts of loans and receivables that are identified as being impaired based on regular reviews of outstanding balances to reduce these loans and receivable to their recoverable amounts.

The recoverable amount of an equity instrument is its fair value. The recoverable amount of debt instruments and purchased loans measured to fair value is calculated as the present value of the expected future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of interest.

An impairment loss is reversed if the reversal can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognized. For financial assets measured at amortized cost and available-for-sale financial assets that are debt securities, the reversal is recognized in the statement of operations. For available-for-sale financial assets that are equity securities, the reversal is recognized directly in equity.

#### Impairment on tangible and intangible assets

On each balance sheet date, the Company evaluates whether there is an indication of impairment of fixed assets. If there is an objective evidence of impairment, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated in accordance with the "TAS 36 – Impairment of Assets" and if the recoverable amount is less than the carrying value of the related asset, a provision for impairment loss is made.

Rediscount and provision expenses of the year are detailed in Note 47.

#### 2.10 Derivative Financial Instruments

As of the reporting date, derivative financial instruments of the Company consist of TurkDEX-ISE 30 Index future contracts. These derivative instruments are treated as held for trading financial assets in compliance with the standard TAS 39 – *Financial Instruments: Recognition and measurement*.

Derivative financial instruments are initially recognized at their acquisition costs and the related transaction costs are included into the acquisition costs.

The receivables and liabilities arising from the derivative transactions are recognized under the off-balance sheet accounts through the contract amounts.

Derivative financial instruments are subsequently remeasured at fair value and positive fair value differences are presented either as "financial assets held for trading" and negative fair value differences are presented as "other financial liabilities" in the accompanying financial statements. All unrealized gains and losses on these instruments are included in the statement of income.

#### 2.11 Offsetting of financial assets

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount is presented in the balance sheet when, and only when, the Company has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Income and expenses are presented on a net basis only when permitted by the Reporting Standards, or for gains and losses arising from a group of transactions resulting from the Company's similar activities like trading transactions.

#### 2.12 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents, which is the basis for the preparation of the statement of cash flows includes cash on hand, cheques received, other cash and cash equivalents, demand deposits and time deposits at banks having an original maturity less than 3 months which are ready to be used by the Company or not blocked for any other purpose.

#### 2.13 Capital

The shareholder having direct or indirect control over the shares of the Company is is Bankası Group by having 76.64% of the outstanding shares of the Company.

As per the resolution of General Assembly held on 26 March 2010, the Company's nominal statutory share capital increased from TL 385,000,000 to TL 525,000,000 by TL 140,000,000 through TL 137,655,806 as transfer from earthquake provision recorded under other reserves in the accompanying financial statements, TL 2,073,977 as transfer from profits on sales of real states and associates that will be transferred to capital and TL 270,217 transfer from extraordinary reserves. #### 2.14 Insurance and investment contracts - classification

An insurance contract is a contract under which the Company accepts significant insurance risk from another party (the policyholder) by agreeing to compensate the policyholder if a specified uncertain future event (the insured event) adversely affects the policyholder. Insurance risk covers all risk except for financial risks. All premiums have been received within the coverage of insurance contracts recognized as revenue under the account caption "written premiums".

Investment contracts are those contracts which transfer financial risk with no significant insurance risk. Financial risk is the risk of a possible future change in a specified interest rate, financial instrument price, commodity price, foreign exchange rate, index of prices or rates, credit rating or credit index or other variable, provided, that it is not specific to a party to the contract, in the case of a non-financial variable.

The Company acts as a reinsurer when writing insurance from an insurance company (cedent) on the basis of reinsurance contracts and cedes insurance business to another retrocessionaire on the basis of retrocession contracts.

As at the reporting date, the Company does not have a contract which is classified as an investment contract.

#### 2.15 Insurance contracts and investment contracts with discretionary participation feature

Discretionary participation feature ("DPF") within insurance contracts and investment contracts is the right to have following benefits in addition to the guaranteed benefits.

- (i) that are likely to comprise a significant portion of the total contractual benefits,
- (ii) whose amount or timing is contractually at the discretion of the Issuer; and
- (iii) that are contractually based on:
  - (1) the performance of a specified pool of contracts or a specified type of contract;
  - (2) realized and/or unrealized investments returns on a specified pool of assets held by the Issuer; or
  - (3) the profit or loss of the Company, Fund or other entity that issues the contract.

As of balance sheet date, the Company does not have any insurance or investment contracts that contain a DPF.

#### 2.16 Investment contracts with DPF

As of the reporting date, the Company does not have any insurance contracts and investment contracts without DPF.

#### 2.17 Liabilities

*Financial liability* is any liability that is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset to another entity. Financial liabilities of the Company are measured at their discounted values. A financial liability is derecognized when it is extinguished.

#### 2.18 Income taxes

#### Corporate tax

Statutory income is subject to corporate tax at 20%. This rate is applied to accounting income modified for certain exemptions (like dividend income) and deductions (like investment incentives), and additions for certain non-tax deductible expenses and allowances for tax purposes. If there is no dividend distribution planned, no further tax charges are made.

Dividends paid to the resident institutions and the institutions working through local offices or representatives are not subject to withholding tax. The withholding tax rate on the dividend payments other than the ones paid to the non-resident institutions generating income in Turkey through their operations or permanent representatives and the resident institutions is 15%. In applying the withholding tax rates on dividend payments to the non-resident institutions and the individuals, the withholding tax rates covered in the related Double Tax Treaty Agreements are taken into account. Appropriation of the retained earnings to capital is not considered as profit distribution and therefore is not subject to withholding tax.

The prepaid taxes are calculated and paid at the rates valid for the earnings of the related years. The payments can be deducted from the annual corporate tax calculated for the whole year earnings.

In accordance with the tax legislation, tax losses can be carried forward to offset against future taxable income for up to five years. Tax losses cannot be carried back to offset profits from previous periods. As at 31 December 2010 and 2009, the Company does not have any deductible tax losses.

In Turkey, there is no procedure for a final and definite agreement on tax assessments. Companies file their tax returns with their tax offices by the end of 25th of the fourth month following the close of the accounting period to which they relate. Tax returns are open for five years from the beginning of the year that follows the date of filing during which time the tax authorities have the right to audit tax returns, and the related accounting records on which they are based, and may issue re-assessments based on their findings.

#### **Deferred tax**

In accordance with TAS 12 – *Income taxes*, deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized on all taxable temporary differences arising between the carrying values of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and their corresponding balances considered in the calculation of the tax base, except for the differences not deductible for tax purposes and initial recognition of assets and liabilities which affect neither accounting nor taxable profit.

The deferred tax assets and liabilities are reported as net in the financial statements if, and only if, the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority on either the same taxable entity.

In case where gains/losses resulting from the subsequent measurement of the assets are recognized in the statement of income, then the related current and/or deferred tax effects are also recognized in the statement of income. On the other hand, if such gains/losses are recognized as an item under equity, then the related current and/or deferred tax effects are also recognized in the statement of income.

#### **Transfer pricing**

In Turkey, the transfer pricing provisions have been stated under the Article 13 of Corporate Tax Law with the heading of "disguised profit distribution via transfer pricing". The General Communiqué on disguised profit distribution via Transfer Pricing, dated 18 November 2007 sets details about implementation.

If a taxpayer enters into transactions regarding sale or purchase of goods and services with related parties, where the prices are not set in accordance with arm's length principle, then related profits are considered to be distributed in a disguised manner through transfer pricing. Such disguised profit distributions through transfer pricing are not accepted as tax deductible for corporate income tax purposes.

#### 2.19 Employee benefits

#### Pension and other post-retirement obligations

A defined benefit plan is a pension plan that defines an amount of pension benefit that an employee and his/her dependants will receive on retirement, usually dependent on one or more factors such as age, years of service and compensation.

Employees of the Company are the members of "Milli Reasürans Türk Anonim Şirketi Emekli ve Sağlık Sandığı Vakfı ("Milli Reasürans Pension Fund") which is established in accordance with the temporary Article 20 of the Social Security Act No: 506.

As per the temporary sub article No: 20 of the Article 73 of the Social Security Law, pension funds should be transferred to the Social Security Institution within three years after the publication of the aforementioned Law published in the Official Gazette numbered 26870 and dated 8 May 2008. The cash value of the obligations of the pension fund for each member of the fund including members left the fund as of the transfer date will be calculated according to following assumptions:

- Technical deficit rate of 9.8% shall be used in the actuarial calculation of the value in cash, and

- Gains and losses of the funds stems from benefits covered by the aforementioned Law taken into accounts to calculate present value of the obligations.

#### **Employee termination benefits**

In accordance with existing Turkish Labour Law, the Company is required to make lump-sum termination indemnities to each employee who has completed one year of service with the Company and whose employment is terminated due to retirement or for reasons other than resignation or misconduct. The computation of the liability is based upon the retirement pay ceiling announced by the Government. The applicable ceiling amount as at 31 December 2010 is TL 2,517 (31 December 2009: TL 2,365).

The Company accounted for employee severance indemnities using actuarial method in compliance with the TAS 19 – *Employee Benefits*. The major actuarial assumptions used in the calculation of the total liability as at 31 December 2010 and 2009 are as follows:

The above expected rate of salary/limit increase is determined according to the annual inflation expectations of the government.

#### **Other benefits**

The Company has provided for undiscounted short-term employee benefits earned during the year as per services rendered in compliance with *TAS 19* in the accompanying financial statements.

#### 2.20 Provisions

A provision is made for an existing obligation resulting from past events if it is probable that the commitment will be settled and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are calculated based on the best estimates of management on the expenses to incur as of the reporting date and, if material, such expenses are discounted to their present values. If the amount is not reliably estimated and there is no probability of cash outflow from the Company to settle the liability, the related liability is considered as "contingent" and disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or nonoccurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Company. Contingent assets are not recognized in financial statements since this may result in the recognition of income that may never be realized. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits will arise, the asset and the related income are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs. If an inflow of economic benefits has become probable, the Company discloses the contingent asset.

#### 2.21 Revenue recognition

#### Written premiums

Written premiums represent premiums taken from insurance and reinsurance companies as a reinsurance company. Premiums ceded to retrocession companies are accounted as "written premiums, ceded" in the profit or loss statement. Written premiums are recorded upon the receipt of quarterly statements of accounts from ceding companies in treaties whereas facultative accounts are registered upon the receipt of monthly bordereaux.

#### Claims paid

Claims paid represent payments of the Company as a reinsurance company when risks taken from insurance and reinsurance companies are realized. Claims are recognised as expense upon the receipt of notifications. Notifications have not specific periods and depend on the initiative of the insurance and reinsurance companies.

#### Commission income and expenses

As further disclosed in Note 2.24 - *Reserve for unearned premiums*, commissions paid to the insurance and reinsurance companies as a reinsurance company and the commissions received from the reinsurance companies are recognized over the life of the contract by deferring commission income and expenses within the calculation of reserve for unearned premiums for the policies produced before 1 January 2008 and recognizing deferred commission income and deferred commission expense in the financial statements for the policies produced after 1 January 2008.

#### Interest income and expenses

Interest income and expense are recognized using the effective interest method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts the estimated future cash payments and receipts through the expected life of the financial asset or liability (or, where appropriate, a shorter period) to the carrying amount of the financial asset or liability. The effective interest rate is established on initial recognition of the financial asset and liability and is not revised subsequently.

The calculation of the effective interest rate includes all fees and points paid or received transaction costs, and discounts or premiums that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. Transaction costs are incremental costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, issue or disposal of a financial asset or liability.

#### Trading income/expense

Trading income/expense includes gains and losses arising from disposals of financial assets held for trading purpose and available-for-sale financial assets. Trading income and trading expenses are recognized as "Income from disposal of financial assets" and "Loss from disposal of financial assets" in the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements.

#### Dividends

Dividend income is recognized when the Company's right to receive payment is ascertained.

#### 2.22 Leasing transaction

As at the reporting date, there is no financial lease contract of the Company.

Payments made under operating leases are recognized in the statement of income on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

#### 2.23 Dividend distribution

As a result of the Ordinary General Meeting of the Company held on 26 March 2010, TL 88,924,641 of the net profit of the 2009 to be distributed through TL 49,960,000 to shareholders, TL 1,667,390 to founder shares and TL 1,429,190 after the allocation of legal reserves and statutory reserves from the net profit.

#### 2.24 Reserve for unearned premiums

In accordance with the "Communiqué on Technical Reserves for Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies and the Related Assets That Should Be Invested Against Those Technical Reserves" ("Communiqué on Technical Reserves") which was issued in 26606 numbered and 7 August 2007 dated Official Gazette and put into effect starting from 1 January 2008, the reserve for unearned premiums represents the proportions of the gross premiums written without deductions of commission or any other allowance, in a period that relate to the period of risk subsequent to the reporting date for all short-term insurance policies. Nonetheless;

- Reserve for unearned premiums are calculated on the basis of 1/8 for reinsurance and retrocession transactions that are not subject to basis of day or 1/24 due to application limitations,

- For commodity transportation policies with indefinite expiration dates, 50% of the remaining portion of the premiums accrued in the last three months, less any commissions is also provided as unearned premium reserves.

In line with the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, the calculation of unearned premium reserve is performed as follows by the Company: for proportional reinsurance contracts, on the basis of 1/8 over the ceded premiums for treaty and facultative contracts, for commodity transportation policies with indefinite expiration dates, 50% of the remaining portion of the premiums accrued in the last three months, less any commissions is also provided as unearned premium reserves and for non-proportional reinsurance contracts, on the basis on day by considering beginning and ending of the contracts. The Company calculates reserve for unearned premiums for ceded premium as retrocedant on the same basis.

Reserve for unearned premiums is calculated for all insurance contracts except for the contracts for which the mathematical reserve is provided. Reserve for unearned premiums is also calculated for the annual premiums of the annually renewed long term insurance contracts.

Since the Communiqué on Technical Reserves was effective from 1 January 2008, the Turkish Treasury issued 4 July 2007 dated and 2007/3 numbered "Circular to Assure the Compliance of the Technical Reserves of Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies With the Insurance Law No.5684" ("Compliance Circular") to regulate the technical provisions between the issuance date and enactment date of the Communiqué on Technical Reserves. In accordance with the Compliance Circular, it is stated that companies should consider earthquake premiums written after 14 June 2007 in the calculation of the reserve for unearned premiums while earthquake premiums were deducted in the calculation of the reserve for unearned premiums were for unearned premiums for the earthquake premiums written after 14 June 2007, while the Company had not calculated reserve for unearned premiums for the earthquake premiums written before 14 June 2007.

In previous years, the reserve for unearned premiums had been calculated after deducting commissions given and commissions received. In order to prevent possible problems during the transfer of the reserves calculated before 1 January 2008, on 28 December 2007 the Turkish Treasury issued "2007/25 Numbered Circular Related to the Calculation of the Reserve for Unearned Premiums and Accounts That Should Be Used for Deferred Commissions Income and Expenses". In accordance with the related circular, the reserve for unearned premiums should be calculated by deducting commissions for the policies produced before 1 January 2008, but it should be calculated on gross basis for the policies produced after 1 January 2008.

According to the "Communiqué on Amendments to Communiqué on Technical Reserves for Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies and the Related Assets That Should Be Invested Against Those Technical Reserves" published in Official Gazette no 27655 dated 28 July 2010; there is no change in the calculation of reserve for unearned premiums for reinsurance companies.

#### 2.25 Provision for outstanding claims

Claims are recorded in the year in which they occur, based on reported claims or on the basis of estimates when not reported. Provision for outstanding claims represents the estimate of the total reported costs of notified claims on an individual case basis at the reporting date as well as the corresponding handling costs.

In accordance with the "Communiqué on Technical Reserves for Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies and the Related Assets That Should Be Invested Against Those Technical Reserves" ("Communiqué on Technical Reserves") which was issued in 27655 numbered and 28 July 2010 dated Official Gazette according to the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, all expenses related to the claim files including calculated or expected expertise, consultant, lawsuit and communication expenses in the calculation of provision for outstanding claims. In these calculations salvage and subrogation income are not considered.

Except for the life branch, provision for outstanding claims consists of claims are recorded in the year in which they occur, based on reported claims and the difference between the result of the actuarial chain ladder method whose content and application criteria stated by the Turkish Treasury and reported but not settled claims are considered as incurred but not reported ("IBNR") claims. Actuarial chain ladder method may be differentiated by the Turkish Treasury for reinsurance companies due to their special conditions.

Methods for the calculation of provision for incurred but not reported claims are determined by the Turkish Treasury in the life-branch.

Actuarial chain ladder method ("ACML") calculation is announced by the Turkish Treasury by "Circular on Actuarial Chain Ladder Method (2010/12)" dated 20 September 2010. There are five methods in the actuarial chain ladder: Standard Chain Ladder, Claim/Premium, Cape Cod, Frequency/Volume and Munich Chain Method. The methods selected for each branch is provided in the following section. The Company has not performed ig claim elimination by Box Plox method.

The company, as a reinsurance company, selects data, adjustments, applicable methods and development factors by itself over the data obtained from insurance companies on a branch basis via actuarial methods. According to the article 11 clause 5 of "Circular on Actuarial Report for Non-Life Insurance Branch" dated 6 November 2008, selections and results should be assess in detail in actuarial report by the actuary.

The Company does not have sufficient data for third party liability on rail, air and water, aircraft, breach of trust, financial losses, legal protection, credit and life branches. Furthermore, claim development tables have irregular distribution for the aforementioned branches. Therefore, the Company prefers to use sector average in the actuarial chain ladder method.

Due to characteristics of reinsurance transactions, business period is used rather than accident period in the actuarial chain ladder method and ACML is calculated annually according to claims paid.

Salvage and subrogation income which will be deducted in the calculation of ACML stated by the Undersecretariat should be based on collected amount (collected amount includes interest income over salvage and subrogation income, expertise, consultant and lawsuit expenses). Collections are taken into account according to their collection period.

In accordance with the temporary articles of the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, companies may use at least 80% and 90% of the result of the IBNR calculated by ACML method or test IBNR for 2010 and 2011, respectively. 100% should be accounted in the financial statements as at 2012 although early implementation of 100% is permitted. As at the reporting date, as a result of actuarial chain ladder method; the Company recorded 80% of additional provision amounting to TL 10,490,219 (31 December 2009: TL 14,122,044) as provision for outstanding claims.

#### 2.26 Mathematical provisions

In accordance with the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, companies operating in life and non-life insurance branches are obliged to allocate adequate mathematical reserves based on actuarial basis to meet liabilities against policyholders and beneficiaries for long-term life, health and personal accident insurance contracts. Actuarial mathematical provisions, according to formulas and basis in approved technical basis of tariffs for over one year-length life insurance, are calculated by determining the difference between present value of liabilities that the Company meets in future and current value of premiums paid by policyholder in future (prospective method).

Mathematical provisions are recorded based on the data sent by ceding companies.

#### 2.27 Reserve for unexpired risk

In accordance with the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, while providing reserve for unearned premiums, in each accounting period, the companies should perform adequacy test covering the preceding 12 months due to the probability that future claims and compensations of the outstanding policies may be in excess of the reserve for unearned premiums already provided. In performing this test, it is required to multiply the reserve for unearned premiums, net with the expected claim/premium ratio. Expected claim/premium ratio is calculated by dividing incurred losses (provision for outstanding claims, net at the end of the period + claims paid, net – provision for outstanding claims, net at the beginning of the period) to earned premiums (written premiums, net + reserve for unearned premiums, net at the beginning of the period – reserve for unearned premiums, net at the end of the period). In the calculation of earned premiums; deferred commission expenses paid to the agencies and deferred commission income received from the reinsurance firms which were netted off from reserve for unearned premiums both at the beginning of the period and at the end of the period are not taken into consideration.

According to the "Communiqué on Amendments to Communiqué on Technical Reserves for Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies and the Related Assets That Should Be Invested Against Those Technical Reserves" published in Official Gazette no 27655 dated 28 July 2010; besides the net reserve for unexpired risk detailed in the above, gross reserve for unexpired risk is also calculated. The test is performed on branch basis and in case where the net and gross expected claim/premium ratio is higher than 95%, reserve calculated by multiplying the exceeding portion of the expected claim/premium ratio with the reserve for unearned premiums of that specific branch is added to the reserves of that branch. Difference between the gross and net amount is represents reinsurer's share. Premiums paid for non-proportional reinsurance agreements are considered as premiums ceded to the reinsurance firms.

In order to eliminate the misleading effect of the revised calculation of outstanding claims reserves, reserve for unexpired risks is calculated with the revised outstanding claims reserve for the opening balance.

As at the reporting date, the Company has provided net reserve for unexpired risk amounting to TL 10,533,898 in the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements (31 December 2009: TL 8,263,495).

#### 2.28 Equalization provision

In accordance with the Communiqué on Technical Reserves put into effect starting from 1 January 2008, the companies should provide equalization provision in credit insurance and earthquake branches to equalize the fluctuations in future possible claims and for catastrophic risks. Equalization provision, started to be provided in 2008, is calculated as 12% of net premiums written in credit insurance and earthquake branches. In the calculation of net premiums, fees paid for non-proportional reinsurance agreements are considered as premiums ceded to the reinsurance firms. The companies should provide equalization provision up to reaching 150% of the highest premium amount written in a year within the last five years. In case where claims incurred, the amounts below exemption limits as stated in the contracts and the share of the reinsurance firms cannot be deducted from equalization provisions. Claims payments are deducted from first year's equalization provisions by first in first out method.

With the Communiqué released on 28 July 2010 and numbered 27655 "Communiqué on Amendments to Communiqué on Technical Reserves for Insurance, Reinsurance and Pension Companies and the Related Assets That Should Be Invested Against Those Technical Reserves", ceded premiums of earthquake and credit for non-proportional reinsurance contracts covered multiple branches should be calculated according to percentage of premiums of those branches within the total premiums unless the Company is determined any other methods. Share of earthquake and credit premium of written premiums for non-proportional reinsurance contracts is based on share of earthquake and credit premiums of proportional reinsurance contracts. In accordance with the Communiqué on Technical Reserves, the Company considers 11% of net death premium (including damage payments) as earthquake premium and 12% of that amount is calculated as equalization provision since the Company not having sufficient data for calculation. After five financial years, in case that provision amount is less than previous year amount depending on written premiums, the difference is recognized in other profit reserves under equity. This amount recorded in equity can either be kept under reserves or can also be used in capital increase or paying claims.

Equalization provisions are presented under "other technical reserves" within long term liabilities in the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements.

#### 2.29 Related parties

For the purpose of the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements, shareholders, key management and members of board of directors together with their families and companies controlled by or affiliated with them, and associated companies are considered and referred to as related parties.

#### 2.30 Earning per share

Earnings per share presented in the income statement is calculated by dividing the net profit into the weighted average number of the outstanding shares throughout the financial year. Companies in Turkey can increase their capital by distributing "bonus shares" to shareholders from the prior years' profit. Such "bonus share" distributions are considered as issued shares in the earnings per share calculations.

#### 2.31 Subsequent events

Post-balance sheet events that provide additional information about the Company's position at the balance sheet date (adjusting events) are reflected in the financial statements. Post-balance sheet events that are not adjusting events are disclosed in the notes when material.

#### 2.32 New standards and interpretations not yet adopted

There are a number of new standards, updates related to the existing standards and interpretations which are not adopted in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements and have not yet entered into force for the accounting period 31 December 2010. These new standards are not expected to have any impact on the financial statements of the Company, with the exception of IFRS 9 – *Financial instruments*, which is published by the Turkish Accounting Standards Board on Official Gazette dated 27 April 2010 and numbered 27564.

• TFRS 9 – *Financial instruments*, is published by International Accounting Standards Board in October 2009 as a part of a wider project that aims to bring new regulations to replace TAS 39 – *Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement*.

Developing a new standard for the financial reporting of financial assets that is principle-based and less complex is aimed by this project. The objective of *TFRS 9*, being the first phase of the project, is to establish principles for the financial reporting of financial assets that will present relevant and useful information to users of financial statements for their assessment of amounts, timing and uncertainty of the entity's future cash flows. With *TFRS 9* an entity shall classify financial assets as subsequently measured at either amortized cost or fair value on the basis of both the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristic of the financial assets. The guidance in TAS 39 on impairment of financial assets and hedge accounting continues to apply.

An entity shall apply TFRS 9 for annually years beginning on or after 1 January 2013. An earlier application is permitted. If an entity adopts this TFRS in its financial statements for a period beginning before 1 January 2012, then prior periods are not needed to be restated.

#### 4 Management of insurance and financial risk

#### 4.1 Management of insurance risk

#### Objective of managing risks arising from insurance (reinsurance) contracts and policies used to minimize such risks:

Reinsurance risk is defined as a possibility of financial loss due to inappropriate and insufficient application of reinsurance techniques in the activities of taking insurance contract responsibility partially or completely.

Potential risks that may be exposed in transactions are described, classified and managed based on the requirements set out in the Company's "Regulative Framework on the Risk Management Activities, Risk Management Policies and Implementation Procedures and Principles of the Risk Management" issued by the approval of the Board of Directors.

The main objective of the "Regulative Framework on the Risk Management Activities, Risk Management Policies and Implementation Procedures and Principles of the Risk Management" is to determine the risk measurement, assessment, and control procedures and maintain consistency between the Company's asset quality and limitations allowed by the insurance standards together with the Company's risk tolerance of the accepted risk level assumed in return for a specific consideration. In this respect, instruments that are related to risk transfer, such as; insurance risk selection, risk quality follow-up by providing accurate and complete information, effective monitoring of level of claims by using risk portfolio claim frequency, treaties, facultative reinsurance contracts and coinsurance agreements, and risk management instruments, such as; risk limitations, are used in achieving the related objective.

Reinsurance risk is measured by quantitative methods and kept under pre-specified limits based on the "Limit over Acceptable Reinsurance Risk and Maximum Custody Share Limit" updated and approved annually by the Board of Directors.

Reinsurance risk is monitored regularly according to criteria described in the "Limit over Acceptable Reinsurance Risk and Maximum Custody Share Limit" policy and results are analysed by the Risk Committee and reported to the Board of Directors. Action plan is determined by the Board of Directors in the case of having exposure higher than acceptable level of risk and probability.

#### Sensitivity to insurance risk

Insurance risks do not generally have significant unrecoverable losses in the course of ordinary transactions, except for risks associated with earthquake and other catastrophic risks. Therefore, there is a high sensitivity to earthquake and catastrophic risks.

The case of potential claims' arising from earthquake and other catastrophic risks exceeding the maximum limit of the excess of loss agreements, such risks are treated as the primary insurance risks and are managed based on the precautionary principle. Maximum limit of excess of loss agreements is determined based on the worst case scenario on the possibility of an earthquake that Istanbul might be exposed to in terms of its severity and any potential losses incurred in accordance with the generally accepted international earthquake models.

Effects of the changes in assumptions used in the measurement of insurance assets and liabilities showing the effect of each change separately that has significant effect on financial statements

In the current year, there are no material changes in the assumptions of measurement of insurance assets and liabilities.

#### 4.2 Management of financial risk

#### Introduction and overview

This note presents information about the Company's exposure to each of the below risks, the Company's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing risk, and the Company's management of capital. The Company has exposure to the following risks from its use of financial instruments:

- credit risk
- liquidity risk
- market risk

The Company is subject to credit risk, market risk (foreign currency risk, interest rate risk and price risk in relation with financial investments) and liquidity risk due to assets and liabilities. The Company's exposure to each of the above risks is assessed according to "Application Principles in Respect of Risk Limits".

The Company monitors its receivables by obtaining comprehensive information about the debtors and debtors' activities. The risk over investment portfolio is managed by measuring and reporting the market risk daily, reassessing the results validity and applying different scenario analyses. The Company's exposure to each of the above risks is measured by Internal Control and Risk Management Service independently, reported to Board of Directors and units of İş Bankası through the Risk Committee.

#### **Credit Risk**

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if counterparties (parties issued financial instrument, insurance companies, reinsurance companies and other debtors) having business relationship with the Company fails to meet its contractual obligations. The Company manages this credit risk by regularly assessing reliability of the counterparties.

Credit risk is measured by both quantitative and qualitative methods and the weighted reinsurers in retrocession programs, credit ratings of them that indicate their financial strengths and their financial positions are analysed.

Doubtful receivables are monitored quarterly.

In addition, concentration of the investment portfolio is assessed quarterly.

The results evaluated by the Risk Committee and reported regularly to the Board of Directors. Action plan is determined by the Board of Directors in the case of having exposure higher than acceptable level of risk and probability.

#### Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset as a result of the imbalance between the Company's cash inflows and outflows in terms of maturity and volume.

The Company's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities.

In respect of this risk which is measured by quantitative methods, any liquidity deficit is observed via the maturity analysis of assets and liabilities in the statement of balance sheet. Furthermore, liquidity structure of the Company is monitored by using the following basic indicators in respect of liquidity ratios:

- Liquid Assets / Total Assets
- Liquidity Ratio
- Current Ratio
- Premium and Reinsurance Receivables / Total Assets

The results evaluated by the Risk Committee and reported regularly to the Board of Directors. Action plan is determined by the Board of Directors in the case of having exposure higher than acceptable level of risk and probability.

#### Management of the liquidity risk

The Company considers the maturity match between asset and liabilities for the purpose of avoiding liquidity risk and ensure that it will always have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due.

#### Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, such as interest rate, foreign exchange rates and credit spreads will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimizing the return on risk.

#### Foreign currency risk

The Company is exposed to foreign currency risk through insurance and reinsurance transactions in foreign currencies.

Foreign exchange gains and losses arising from foreign currency transactions are recorded at transaction dates. At the end of the years, foreign currency assets and liabilities evaluated by the Central Bank of the Republic of Turkey's spot purchase rates and the differences arising from foreign currency rates are recorded as foreign exchange gain or loss in the statement of operations.

#### Legal reserves

The legal reserves consist of first and second legal reserves in accordance with the Turkish Commercial Code. The first legal reserve is appropriated out of the statutory profits at the rate of 5%, until the total reserve reaches a maximum of 20% of the entity's share capital. The second legal reserve is appropriated at the rate of 10% of all distributions in excess of 5% of the entity's share capital. The first and second legal reserves are not available for distribution unless they exceed 50% of the share capital, but may be used to absorb losses in the event that the general reserve is exhausted.

#### Other profit reserves

In accordance with the 4 July 2007 dated and 2007/3 numbered Compliance Circular issued by the Turkish Treasury, it was stated that the companies would not further provide earthquake provision for the year 2007. However, it was also stated that earthquake provisions provided in previous periods (earthquake provision in the financial statements as at 31 December 2006) should be transferred to the reserve accounts under equity in accordance with the 5<sup>th</sup> Temporary Article of the Insurance Law. The companies had to transfer total amount of provisions, including earthquake provisions reserved as at 31 December 2006 and related gains obtained from investment of these amounts, to the account called as "549.01 – transferred earthquake provisions" which would be opened as at 1 September 2007 within Uniform Chart of Account and the reserves amount should not be subject to dividend distribution or should not be transferred to other accounts.

Accordingly, the Company initially transferred total provisions amounting to TL 137,655,806, including earthquake provisions reserved as at 31 December 2006 and related gains obtained from investment of this amount, to the reserve accounts under equity. Full amount is used for capital increase in 2010 (*Note 2.13*).

#### Other capital reserves

In accordance with tax legislation, 75% of profits from sales of participation shares and real states included in the assets of companies is exempt from corporate tax provided that it is classified under a special fund for full five years. The exempt gains cannot be transferred to another account other than a capital increase or cannot be withdrawn from the entity for five years. Tax exempt gain from real estate sale amounting to TL 2,073,977 as at 31 December 2009 is used in capital increase in 2010 (*Note 2.13*).

#### Statutory Reserves

After the allocation of first legal reserves and first dividend to shareholders, reserve for natural disasters and catastrophe might be allocated, if deemed necessary, based on the suggestion of the Board of Directors and decision of the General Assembly. As at 31 December 2010, total amount of statutory reserves allocated as mentioned method is TL 91,000,000 and the Company allocated TL 23,500,000 (31 December 2008: TL 8,500,000) to natural disasters and catastrophe reserve from the profit of 2009 (Note 38).

Employees of the Company are the members of "Milli Reasürans Türk Anonim Şirketi Emekli ve Sağlık Sandığı Vakfı ("Milli Reasürans Pension Fund") which is established in accordance with the temporary Article 20 of the Social Security Act No: 506.

As per the provisional article No: 23 of the Banking Law No: 5411, pension funds of the banks which were established within the framework of Social Security Institution Law, should be transferred to the Social Security Institution within three years after the publication of the prevailing Banking Law enacted on 1 November 2005. Methods and principles related to the transfer have been determined as per the Cabinet decision no: 2006/11345 published on 30 November 2006. However, the said article of the Banking Law has been vetoed by the President on 2 November 2005 and the execution of the article was ceased based on the Supreme Court's decision numbered E.2005/39, K.2007/33 and dated 22 March 2007 effective from 31 March 2007.

Following annulment of the temporary Article 23 of the Banking Law, the new law "Amendments to the Social Security and General Health Insurance Act Including Certain Laws and Decrees" was published in the Official Gazette dated 8 May 2008 and came into force. The new law requires transfer of the participants or beneficiaries of pension funds to Social Security Institution as at the effective date of the Act within 3 years and prescribes the extension period of the transfer as maximum of two years upon the order of the Cabinet.

As per the temporary sub article No: 20 of the Article 73 of the above mentioned law also includes the following:

• technical deficit rate of 9.8% shall be used in the actuarial calculation of the value in cash, and

• uncovered other rights and compensations of participants or beneficiaries of pension funds should be covered by the entities who transfer the funds.

On the other hand, on 19 June 2008, CHP applied to the Constitutional Court for the annulment and motion for the stay of some articles, including the first paragraph of the temporary article 20 of the Banking Law, which covers provisions on transfers. As at the reporting date, no decision has been taken by the Constitutional Court in relation to abrogation of such court case.

The benefits stated in the settlement deeds of pension fund but not subject to transfer will continue to be covered by the pension funds.

An actuarial report has been obtained from registered actuary regarding calculation of the amount to be paid to the Social Security Institution by the Company in accordance with the new law. As per the calculations based on the above mentioned assumptions, actuarial and technical deficit amounting to TL 20,773,255 (31 December 2009: TL 19,416,590) is accounted as "Provision for pension fund deficits" in the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements.
